ne into his possession. After thought-89 ful reading, Mr. Allington was im-pressed with its truthfulness and sought more information about the teachings of Mormonism. A correspondence was opened up with Elders in Australia but several years elapsed before a servant of God could visit New Zealand. In the meantime many others became interested, and when Elder R. Beau-champ arrived about 1869 a number of persons were ready for baptism, having been prepared and taught by Henry Allington, who was one of the first bap-tized by Elder Beauchamp.

A small branch of the Church was organized with Brother Allington as presiding Elder, and from that time he be came an earnest and indefatigable worker and may be justly styled one of the fathers of the New Zealand mis-

Henry Allington was born in Warickshire.England, and when but a boy, ccompanied his parents to the olonies-arriving there about 1842. had an eventful career, having visited Australia when the gold fever was at its height. Subsequently he served on a whaling vessel and was wrecked at New Caledonia. He finally returned to New Zealand and engaged as school teacher at Karori, a small village near Wellington. He was exceedingly kind and amiable and endeared himself to and amiable and endeared nimself to all who were privileged to know him. His name is lovingly remembered by many Latter-day Saints scattered throughout the New Zealand mission. In the year 1572, Elder Henry Allington and his family emigrated to Utah and settled in Big Cottonwood, Salt Lake county. He was a zealous worker in Sunday school and held many im-

ortant offices in the Church. His death occurred September 28, 1901,

when he was 64 years of age. The funeral services were held in the Big Cottonwood meeting housee on Tuesday, October 1st, and were largely attended. The services were conducted by Bishop Casto and addresses were delivered by Elders F. McDonald, E. Goddard, E. T. Stevenson, Orson Rom-ney and J. S. Groesbeck. The last four were returned Elders from New Zea land and all testified to the sterling character of the deceased and referred his noble and untiring efforts in that far-off land to spread the cause of
