LOCAL BRIEFS.

Lake Reeding.—The level of the Great Salt Lake has fallen 1-5 of a foot within the last two weeks.

Form Social Club.—The American Social club has been organized in this city by a number of colored people.

Ferrin Recovers in Ely.—Joseph Ferrin, a well known mining man of this city, has recovered at the Ely, Nev. hospital from serious illness.

Returns to Vancouver.—Archbishop Dantonville, with his secretary, returned to Vancouver, B. C., yesterday afternoon for his home at Vancouver, after a pleasant visit with his former pupil, Charles S. Vadner.

Auto Victim Buried.—The funeral of little Ora Novy, who was fatally injured by being struck by an automobile in Second avenue Friday evening, was held yesterday afternoon from the residence, 1121 Second avenue, with burial in City cemetery.

Prof. Lincoln to Leave.—Prof. T. W. Lincoln of Long Beach, California, and formerly principal of the Salt Lake Seminary (Methodist), attended the encampment, and gave stereoscopic lectures on California, and will visit with friends in Provo tomorrow and then return home.

Valuable Watch Missing.—The assistance of the police in recovering a handbag containing a valuable diamond-studded gold watch, was secured last night by Mrs. Mary Monroe of Helena, Mont. Mrs. Monroe was uncertain whether she had lost the bag or if it had been stolen from her.

Thief Returns Ticket.—J. F. Williams, a tourist who was robbed of his pocketbook a few days ago, returned his railroad ticket from Chicago to Portland which he had carried in the wallet. The thief had dropped the ticket in a street mail box, but overlooked returning the \$8 cash.

Wetzell on Vacation.—Prof. W. A. Wetzell leaves today for Green River, Utah, to camp with his family for three weeks with dog and gun, forgetting that there ever was such a thing as school. He is pretty well tired out, especially after the protracted work in driving the school children for the living flag.

Laborer Falls from Car.—Peter Panos, a Greek railroad laborer, sustained slight injuries last night by falling from a four wheel car at the corner of Third and Second South streets. He was rendered unconscious by the fall and taken to the emergency hospital and later removed to the Groves L. D. S. hospital.

Her Sanity Questioned.—Mrs. Anna Studdess, who several weeks ago was taken into custody as an insane person, and later discharged after an examination before the insanity commission, was re-arrested yesterday by Detectives Axel Steel and Andy Smith. Mrs. Studdess will be held pending a second examination for her sanity.

He came to Utah in 1880, when he opened a meat market in the Twelfth ward. He leaves a brother, W. L. Butler of this city.

Falls From Car.—Rev. Michael Curran, assistant pastor of St. Mary's cathedral, stepped from a South Temple street car last evening before it stopped, and was thrown violently to the pavement. He was picked up partially unconscious and badly bruised, and carried into Bishop Scammon's residence close by, where Dr. McDonald attended to him.

Turner Family Deported.—Inspector J. C. Hise, of the United States Immigration service in this city, has returned from a trip to Canada, after deporting a family named Turner, living in Ogden. Walter J. Turner came from Canada two years ago with a wife and five children. He has since been adjudged insane, and was accordingly deported.

Comes Here for Patten.—Under Sheriff Mike Starnes, from Blaine county, Montana, arrived in the city last night for the purpose of returning T. H. Patten who was caught in Salt Lake Saturday, to Butte, where he is wanted. Sheriff Starnes has the requisition papers will be prepared today and the deputy will probably return with his prisoner tomorrow.

Rush Service.—The Postal Telegraph company has added Salt Lake City to the list of first class cities to be given special rush service on account of the increased volume of telegraphic traffic. This means that no telegram will be over five minutes in passing over the wires, to insure which the company has expended considerable money in provision of adequate facilities.

Since that time Mrs. Hampton has been attempting to make a settlement.

Veteran Musicians Gone.—The veteran drummers and fifeers left for their homes in the east yesterday, after making one more round of sending. They took away the best impressions of the city and its hospitality, and are particularly pleased with Saturday afternoon's visit to Fort Douglas, through the courtesy of Manager J. S. Wells of the Utah Light & Air company, and Manager Marjorie of the "Seaside Salt Lake" company. The Fifteenth Infantry officers were very cordial in their welcome.

First Funeral in Cathedral.—The first funeral in the new Catholic cathedral

was held there yesterday, that of Thomas Tallon, a well known Park City mining man. The service was attended by a large number of citizens from the Park. The Rev. W. K. Ryan, a personal friend of the deceased, preached the sermon. The many floral offerings were taken to Mt. Olivet cemetery instead of to the church, in accordance with the wish of Mr. Tallon.
