civilization. May 18, 1855, they started on this mission through an entirely unexplored country, having to make their roads and bridges as they went. In the organization David Moore was made sec retary. Thirteen wagons and fifty-two oxen furnished their transportation.

During this mission untold hardships were endured and on account of sup-plies running short David Moore and others returned to Utah for supplies.
