Skeen was elected in his stead, that Skeen duly qualified, but that Brummit has refused to turn over the seal of the corporation and its property. They also claim that while Brummit has had the property, consisting of books, papers, certificates, contracts and the like in his possession, the same has been damaged, mutilated and otherwise destroyed to the extent of \$5,000. The company filed an indemnifying bond with the sheriff and under claim and delivery proceedings, that official searched Brummit's office, taking away all of the company's prop-
