EASTERN.

Dead.
Mrs. Sarah J. Conway, of the
Brooklyn Theatre died to-night, at
her residence in Brooklyn.

Local Option.
BOSTON, Mass., 23.—The State
temperance alliance, to-day, ad-
dressed an address to the people, urging
them to take advantage of the
clause in the new liquor law, afford-
ing local option as a protection
against the licensed sale of liquor.

The Blockade Over.
OMAHA, Neb., 23.—At half past
one this p.m. the last break on the
Union Pacific road was closed near
Green River, and all the trains
waiting at that point passed over
the new bridges east and west.
Two emigrant trains, which left
Omaha on Sunday, with over a
thousand passengers, have gone
through without transferring, also
the express trains leaving Monday
morning. There is now no interrup-
tion to the regular movements of
trains between Omaha and San
Francisco.

FOREIGN.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Dead.
LONDON, 23.—Sir Gillery Pigott,
pulsive Baron of the Court of Ex-
chequer, died to-day.

Remarks by John Bright.
At the reception given Chevalier,
the distinguished French econo-
mist, in Birmingham, this evening,
John Bright made some remarks on
free trade, in the course of which he
said it was ludicrous for the U. S. to
invite foreign manufacturers to
compete at an exhibition, when
the protective tariff prevented them
from competing in the American
markets.

SPAIN.

German Fleet Saluted.
SANTANDER, 23.—As the final
act of reparation for the Gestaout
outrage, the Spanish commander at
Gestaout, on the arrival of the Ger-
man fleet off that point, fired a salu-
te of 21 guns.

BELOIUM.

Miners Riots.
BRUSSELS, 23.—The trouble with
the miners at Charleroi continues,
and serious riots are reported.

PRUSSIA.

Local Proceedings Commenced.
BERLIN, 23.—Legal proceedings
have been commenced by the Prus-
sian government for the removal of
the Prince Bishop of Breslau, for
the violation of the ecclesiastical
laws.

AUSTRIA.

Demonstration Against Don
Alphonso.
VIENNA, 23.—Violent demon-
strations have been made against
Don Alphonso, who is residing at Graz;
the mob attempted to enter his
villa, where the police were called
out to protect it and several ris-
ers were arrested.

WEST INDIES.

Amnesty Offered to Insurgents.
HAVANA, 23.—Captain General
Valmaseda has issued a proclama-
tion, offering pardon to rebels who
surrender before May 30, 1875; the
pardon is unconditional for all ex-
cept deserters from the Spanish
force, who will be required to serve
in the vanguard of the army until
the end of the war. The proclama-
tion declares that enough loyal
bayonets remain in Spain to make
those Spanish soldiers bite the dust
who continue in close union with
the insurgents, shedding the blood
of their former companions and brothers.
