FOREIGN.

LONDON, 25.—In accordance with the notices given by the cotton masters of Ashton, Staleybridge, Dunkenfield and Mossley, a lock-out commenced in several of the mills on Saturday, and unless the operatives yield by the end of a month the mills still open will be closed as the time of the notice expires, in which case several thousand people will be thrown out of employment. In the meantime the strike set on foot by the operatives in Oldham goes into effect to-morrow, and will involve 100 mills and 13,000 hands.

The working men's associations of Yorkshire, Lancashire and Cheshire have resolved to support the locked-out and striking mill operatives. The Standard reports that Mr. Scudamore will retire from the British Post Office, and go to Turkey to organize a postal service there, in accordance with the Berne convention.

BERLIN, 25.—The North German Gazette, commenting on the recent submissions of Catholic clergymen to the law for the administration of church property, says, "The episcopate has thereby abandoned the principle hitherto maintained, that politics in ecclesiastical matters can only be regulated by means of independent arrangements between the state and church." The Gazette infers that the Roman curia has given permission to the clergy to decide for themselves, at the same time assuring them that a decision in favor of submission will not be regarded as an act of disobedience to papal authority. "This," continues the Gazette, "may be considered as changing the struggle between the political and ecclesiastical powers, and the Catholic episcopate will probably urge upon Rome the necessity of extending further freedom of action in these matters."

PARIS, 25.—Athenaeus Dascie Coquerel, the eminent Protestant minister, is dead.

The official statement of Caelleux, Minister of Public Works, to the Assembly, estimates the total damage done to property by the inundations in the south of France at fifteen millions of dollars.

LONDON, 26.—A telegram from Berlin to the Morning Post says: "It is reported that Count Schouvaloff, the Russian minister at London, has asked to be recalled in consequence of a recent assertion by Mr. Burke, under secretary of the foreign department, in the House of Commons, that Russia had violated her promise in regard to Khiva." It is understood that Count Schouvaloff conveyed the promises in question to the British government.

The Times understands that Pimms has procured a revival of his shipping bill, which he had previously abandoned in favor of the government's measure, and that it will now be placed on the order book for Thursday. Pimms will then apologize to the House, and consent to the passage of the bill as a provisional measure for one year only.

The Daily News' special from Lisbon reports that a drought in several districts of the Province of Minho has destroyed the crops and pastures, that famine is threatened, that riots against grain exporters are imminent, and that cattle are dying of hunger. The local authorities report that it will be impossible to collect the taxes in many places, and an attempt to do so they fear would cause an insurrection. Accounts from Algarve show a similar state of affairs in that province. The government is sending relief to the afflicted sections.

The managers of the direct United States cable says that no stockholder has been denied information. A small portion of the cable has been injured, probably by ice, but the contractors are now replacing the injured part with good cable.

PANAMA, July 17.—Peace has been restored at San Miguel, the scene of the late ultramontane riots in Salvador. The bishop of Santa Tecla and seven priests were secretly arrested, and hurried, under a guard of one hundred soldiers, to port Libertad, where they were put on board a steamer and sent into Nicaragua. Several other prelates have been expelled the country. It was discovered that similar outbreaks to that at San Miguel had been arranged all over the republic.

EXCOMMUNICATING GRASSHOPPERS.—In 1670 there was a plague of caterpillars in Auvergne, and, by order of the Bishop, a legal document was made out calling on the caterpillars to appear in court before him, and requiring them, under pain of excommunication, to leave the country. A recent English writer on travels assures the skeptical that the original document may be seen in the library at Clermont. The practical difficulty in the way of applying this plan to the Western States would be that, in a region which has fifty religions and only one gray, the influence of religion has been so subdivided that one Bishop, single-handed, could hardly overawe more than one grasshopper. Fifty Bishops might accomplish something, but it is to be feared that it is too late. The grasshoppers are naturalized and have acquired the national vice of irreverence.—N. Y. Tribune.

A PROGRESSIVE PEOPLE.—The aggregate city debt on the 1st of Jan. last was one hundred and forty-two million dollars. If we add to this the floating debt, unpaid judgments and claims in suit it will reach one hundred and sixty-four millions. Then a deficiency exists in the treasury, owing to uncollected taxes and assessments of about twelve millions, making our real public indebtedness about one hundred and seventy-six millions. This on the basis of a million population is a per capita of one hundred and seventy-six dollars. The year's appropriations for the expenses of the government amount to nearly thirty-eight million dollars. This is a per capita of thirty-eight dollars. Our united debt and taxation therefore averages two hundred and fourteen dollars for every man, woman and child in the city. Who says we are not a progressive people?—N. Y. Herald, July 6.
