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In Woman's World

In all the latest dresses there is a marked absence of the high waistline, writes Clara E. Simcox in the Deseret for December.

The waistline is coming back to its normal place. Many dresses, of course, are still made with high waistlines, but they are rather the exception than the rule.

In most cases the natural waistline is either emphatically defined by a girle or such or else it is clearly indicated by the close princess fit of the dress. On the whole, I think, women will regret the passing of the high waistline, it was a graceful style for the right woman, but a most unfortunate one for a figure not built on slender willowy lines.

A fashion that can only be worn successfully by a few never has a vogue of lasting duration. Every one will take it up at first because it is new and smart, but as soon as they give it a fair trial and find it unbecoming it is sure to be dropped.

That is one reason why I believe so firmly in the present styles. They are so varied that any woman can suit herself to perfection in one phase or another of them. The only trouble is that each and every one of them is so attractive that most women will want to wear them all. However, that is a matter that will soon adjust itself.

A good many of the new Moynagh dresses show a yoke cut into points in some way or other to break the straight line between the over and under skirts. On a very beautiful reception gown, the points came at either side of the front of the yoke. The lower part of the skirt was laid in groups of shallow tucks that held in the fullness of the dress for some five or six inches below the yoke. The waist was tucked at the back and front to match the skirt, though very little of the tucking

showed under the wide bands of steel-embroidered net that crossed the bodice in surplus fashion at the front and met in back in a deep V.

The dress was made of silk crepon in the new shade of deep bluish purple, known as verdelage or grape. Steel beads are used lavishly on the new gowns and take the form of wonderful embroideries scattered with a prodigious hand over both waists and skirts. Silver, gold and rhinestones are used as well as steel, but are seen little for. Metal fruits and flowers are quite the rage, clusters of them catching up the drapery or an overskirt or holding in the laces or chiffons of a bodice.

A simple fire extinguisher may be made at home, and it kept always on hand, will sometimes prove of great value. Take 20 pounds of common salt and 10 pounds of ammoniac or nitrate of ammoniac, which can be bought at any drug store. Dissolve these in seven gallons of water. Put in thin glass bottles holding a quart each, cork tightly, and seal to prevent evaporation. When a fire breaks out, throw one of these bottles so that it will break in or near the flames, or if this is not possible, break off the neck of the bottle and scatter the contents on the fire. This has been tested. Sometimes it is necessary to use several bottles.

Charcoal has great value as an antiseptic. Smoked ham will keep for years packed in charcoal. A few lumps of it in a cistern will keep the water pure and sweet. A quantity of it in a cellar will absorb the odors, and a small lump boiled with cabbage or onions will do the same. Butter put into small vessels completely surrounded with charcoal will keep almost a long time. A paste of powdered charcoal and honey makes a good dentifrice. It not only cleans the teeth, but disinfects them and sweetens the breath. Taken inwardly it is good for the digestion and relieves constipation.

Let the thin girl remember this: Don't walk until you are dead tired. Overworking will make you haggard. Don't wear black. Black has a tendency to make any one look slender. Light clothes are the most becoming. Don't have your finger to close fitting. A full front in your corset is an immense improvement. Don't strive for long waisted effects or use pointed girdles. The longer you make yourself look the thinner you will appear.

Don't stay up too late at night. Get at least nine hours' good sleep. Don't wear stripes. Checks, plaids and horizontal effects are better for thin women. They should strive for becoming, deceiving effects. If they study art in dressing at all. Don't wear a large, brimmed hat. It looks out of proportion, especially as the face of a slender girl is usually small. A moderate sized or small hat will be found much better. Don't fail to have your gowns made with an eye to hiding the fact that you are too slender. Full skirts, flared fronts and bouffant effects are the most becoming.

Don't fail to look dainty. Slender women can always do that, and the most delightful word that can be applied to a woman is the word dainty. A woman may be stylish, well dressed, good looking and a half hundred other things without any considerable amount of trouble, but to live up to the requirements of the word dainty means something more. It means absolute freshness of material, or ribbons, laces, muslins, garnitures of all kinds. It means muslins uncrumpled, ruffles fresh from laundering, laces ruffled from the world and everything else. It means water and soap and starch in abundance, together with unceasing care. But it is worth it.

Cornecbs furnish the most excellent material for smoking meat. Cornecbs placed in musty syrups and the latter brought to a scolding heat will impart a palatable flavor.
