COOLING ROOMS IN SUMMER.—The Scientific American tells, in the following paragraph, how a room or the entire house may be made cool in warm weather:—

"The first necessity is a thorough draft. This can always be obtained by opening every door and window in the basement, the top of every window above, and by throwing each door wide open; but above all, be sure that the trap door in the roof is open, and there is plenty of air from it down the stairs, so that whichever be the direction of the wind, there will be at least one ascending current of air into the house. Another requisite is shade. Our common slat shutters answer as well for the windows, but the most cheap and convenient shelter for the roof is to cover thickly with straw, dried reeds, or rushes. These will resist the influence of the noonday sun, and keep the garret almost as cool as the basement. One of the most simple methods, and at the same time cheapest means of artificially lowering the temperature of a room, is to wet a cloth of any size, the larger the better, and suspend it in the place you want cooling; let the room be well ventilated, and the temperature will sink from ten to twenty degrees in less than half an hour."
