LEAD AND SUGAR.

The Senate Need Not Consider the House Free Lead Bill.

A SUGGESTION FOR A SUGAR BOSS.

Persons as in the Fate of the Bill When the Senate Meets in December.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—Senator White, the new member of the Finance committee, is not in favor of free silver and lead, and he will not support the House bill. He has suggested that the Senate need not take into consideration the House free lead bill.

The sugar men have taken a great deal of comfort over the vote recently taken on the motion of Senator Mendenhall to instruct the Senate Finance committee to report an amendment to the free sugar bill re-establishing the McKinley sugar bounty. It was shown that a majority of the Senate was for a bounty. When the Senate meets in December, Mendenhall may not vote with the sugar men. He has suggested that the Senate need not take into consideration the House free lead bill.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—The Finance committee is still in the dust. The House has passed the free sugar bill, but the Senate has not yet taken any action on it. The sugar men are waiting for the Senate to act.
