CONGRESSIONAL.

HOUSE.

San Domingo and other matters.

The foreign committee had up Paraguan matters, but were not able to finish. The only point of public interest in this connection is their efforts to put naval and diplomatic officers on a more cordial footing, but there is not much prospect of legislation on the subject during the present session. There is a prospect of a further movement in the San Domingo matter at the present time, in favor of putting annexation through by a joint resolution. Butler seems, at length, to have given up the idea he has talked a good deal about, of sending to the island another commission for investigation, as he has not yet done anything in that direction. Some New York gentlemen interested in San Domingo have been here this week and talked to the President, and to-day it is given out in the White House circles that the treaty is by no means dead. The Times' special says there is no longer any doubt that before Congress adjourns it will pass an act to enable the newly-organized State government to elect two Senators and one Representative to Congress, and apply for admission into the Union next December. The committee on territories in the House are already prepared to report a bill to this effect.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.
Big Fire.

NASHUA.—The First Congregational Church, and some adjoining buildings, including the post office block, was burned last night; loss \$100,000. Two firemen were slightly injured.

NEW YORK.

Commodore Meade Struck with Paralysis—Arrested—Meade dead—7000 Emigrants arrived—Attempt to shoot—Schooner Burned.

New York.—Yesterday, being Good Friday, was signalized by the usual services in the Episcopal and Roman Catholic churches and by the suspension of business by the City Hall officials and others. A special says that General Stone, who served under McClellan, has entered the service of the Viceroy of Egypt and sails for Alexandria to-morrow. A number of other ex-Federal and Confederate officers have gone also. The agent of the Viceroy is making regular shipments of breech-loading rifles.

Among the roughs captured at New Haven, while attending the prize fight, were three Brooklyn aldermen, who are still in jail. There are over forty others in custody. Governor Jewett says he will send as many as possible to the penitentiary for two years. Commodore Meade was struck with paralysis last evening, in Brooklyn, and was sent to the city hospital. Charles P. Riggs and Frank Jones have been arrested for attempting to sell stolen bonds of the Atlantic and Great Western Railroad, with the names of L. Otis and Jay Gould forged. Commodore Meade died yesterday, of apoplexy.

Over seven thousand emigrants have arrived during the past week. Dr. Carleton, author of a history of the United States, dedicated to President Lincoln, died yesterday.

An attempt was made at Madison, N. J., on Friday evening, to assassinate Mrs. Eliza O'Gorman, a lecturer on Catholicism; a shot was fired from the mob, but missed its aim.

The schooner John Limborno, yesterday, was reported burned at sea and abandoned; the fate of the crew is unknown.

It is officially announced that the delegates for conducting the local examination at Oxford University, will admit girls to examination in June.

ILLINOIS.

Difficulty settled—Affairs in Cuba—Investigation.

CHICAGO.—Three inches of snow fell here last night. The difficulty in regard to the Sheriff's office came into court to be settled to-day; the deputies of the absconding Sheriff Fisher, surrendered the office to the coroner as the ex-officio sheriff.

A Washington special says the State Department is in receipt of dispatches from our consul at Havana, in which he represents that affairs there are unfavorable to the insurgents, and the impression is that the rebellion will last but a little longer.

The Tribune's Washington special says the evidence in the investigation of the Freedmen's Bureau affairs, show that General Howard and his brother Charles are the owners of the patent brick of which the Howard university is built, and that they made a large sum of money out of it.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Shooting.

READING, 17.—John Tutz yesterday shot his wife and an employee of his named Shay, wounding the former slightly and the latter dangerously. Tutz surrendered himself, alleging undue familiarity between the parties as the cause.

MISSOURI.

Resolution of Thanks, &c.—Snow Storm.

ST. LOUIS.—The Woman's Suffrage Association, this evening, passed a resolution of thanks to Julian for introducing into Congress the 16th amendment; and another urging the Missouri delegation to use its influence to procure the passage of the amendment.

Ballard, an old man, was murdered at Whitehall, Ill., yesterday, by a man, who afterwards went to the principal hotel and registered his name as a present and former resident. He added "I have got revenge, and do not rub this out till published." The man, who is supposed to be insane, was arrested and lodged in jail, after repeated attempts to lynch him.

WASHINGTON.

Military Orders—Factory Burned—Public Business in Arrears, &c.

General Order, number 41, head quarters of the army, assigns General Schofield to the command of the military division of the Pacific. The department of Alaska will be discontinued after the first of July, and the territory is attached to the department of the Columbia. Major General Canby commanding. A new department is created, styled the department of Arizona, embracing Arizona and Southern California. General Stoneman commanding. General Pope is assigned to the command of the department of Missouri, when vacated by Schofield, head quarters at Leavenworth. The department of the Lakes is enlarged so as to embrace the frontier as far east as Lake Champlain, and General Cook is assigned to the command, after June first. Virginia is annexed to the department of the East, and is commanded by General McDonald, and the department of the Cumberland is discontinued. The troops within the latter will be attached to the department of the South, Gen. Terry commanding.

The glass manufactory of John Pardey, number 50 E street, was burned to-night. Loss, about \$100,000. It was the work of an incendiary. Public business in Congress was never before so far in arrears: no one thinks of ending the session before the first of July. Nothing whatever has been done here towards re-opening the Alabama claims' question, our government will probably await the movement of Great Britain.

Official information has been received of the approaching Fenian designs on Canada, but nothing on which the Government can act. A letter from Gen. Sanborn, of the Indian Commission, explains the cause of the recent raid up the road by the Dakota Indians, in which he says that fears of a general Indian war are seriously entertained.

OHIO.

Disgraceful scenes in the Legislature.

COLUMBUS.—Both houses of the General Assembly held a stormy session last night, the House adjourning at midnight and the Senate at five o'clock a.m. In the House the Democrats offered a protest against the provision ratifying the 15th amendment. The Speaker pro tem. ruled the protest out of order, and containing language disrespectful to the members. During the discussion McVay and Para, both Democrats, got into an altercation, during which one attempted to strike the other. The Speaker, Cunningham, made an effective speech, defending the vote for the amendment. During his speech Darber called him a liar and shook his fist in his face. The excitement was intense. The decision of the Speaker pro tem. was sustained 49 to 41. In the Senate the Democrats attempted to defeat the confirmation of the Governor's appointment for manager of the soldiers' and sailors' orphan's home. The Republicans delayed the matter till 2.30 a.m., when Senator Gath came up from Xenia, giving the Republicans a majority. At three o'clock the Democratic Senators left the chambers in a body in order to break up the quorum. One of them was captured and returned to make up the quorum. The appointments were then confirmed.

FOREIGN NEWS.

SPAIN.

Separation of Church and State Demanded—Banished for a Month.

MADRID.—The Republican journals demand the separation of Church and State, and that all priests or bishops refusing to take the oath to the constitution be sent to Rome. The Duke of Montpensier has been banished from Madrid for a month; he has gone to Seville.

PORTUGAL.

Extinction of the Paraguayan War.

LISBON.—The Rio Janeiro steamer, to-day, brings the details of the end of the war in Paraguay. On the 1st of March the Brazilian General carried the position of Lopez. Lopez and his son, Col. Lopez, F. Faneche, vice President of the Republic, Gen. Comino and several other high officers of Paraguay were killed. The mother, brother and four children of Lopez, Mrs. Lynch and many officers were taken prisoners; a large quantity of arms and munitions of war were also captured. At the last advices a treaty of peace was being prepared with the provisional government of Paraguay, which had convened a constitutional assembly for that purpose.

CANADA.

Preparing for the Fenians.

OTTAWA.—Scott, the delegate from Red River, was arrested last night, for being an accessory to the murder of Thos. Scott at Fort Garry. At the last advices Dr. Schultz arrived this evening, accompanied by Dr. Lynch. All the country volunteers ordered on

duty have arrived except the eleventh battalion. The city corps has been ordered to drill two hours a day as long as apprehensions of trouble exist. The regulars will be allowed to continue their ordinary avocations. Affairs on the border are quiet. Volunteers from the country continue to arrive.

GREAT BRITAIN.

The Ballot pronounced a mischievous delusion—Railway collision.

LONDON.—Five hundred emigrants departed from this city yesterday for Canada, per steamship Medway. The Edinburgh Review has, to-day, an article on the ballot, in which the writer quotes from Greeley and others, to prove that the ballot secures no secrecy in voting, and is, therefore, a mischievous delusion. A collision occurred to-day on the London and North Western Railroad, in which several persons were badly injured.

FRANCE.

PARIS.—The Raphael publishes a dispatch from Lacrenoz announcing that the strike was ended there for the time being.

A large meeting was held last night by members of the Left Centre and radical journalists, sixty-two provincial and fourteen Paris journals being represented. It was decided by the meeting to vote negatively on the plebiscitum and circulate a manifesto against its object. The deputies of the Left Centre of the Corps Legislatif meet to-morrow to decide what course to pursue in regard to the plebiscitum.
