WASHINGTON, April 24.—Nobility paid its respects to democracy this afternoon at the White House, when the Duke of Veragua called on President Cleveland. Commander Dickson made the introductions, and a few words were spoken, with just a suggestion of formality, by the duke and the President in reference to the visit of the duke to America. Assistant Secretary McAdoo received the visitors and after a minute spent in conversation, accompanied them to the state department where they were met by Secretary Gresham in the diplomatic room. Escorted by Assistant Secretary Adams of the state department the duke and his party went to the office of Secretary Lansing and paid their respects. Then the reception and the party returned to the Arlington.

REVENUE COURT DECISION.

The United States Supreme court today affirmed the judgment of the United States circuit court for the state of Washington in refusing to grant a writ of habeas corpus in the case of Albert Furber, now undergoing a sentence of ten years' imprisonment for murder in the second degree. A new presenting unusual and novel feature was decided by the Supreme court today, Justice Gray delivering the opinion. It was entitled the Northern Pacific railroad company vs. C. C. Furber. The defendant, involving a number of saloon-keepers and the board of commissioners of the city of Seattle, Washington. The railroad company brought suit to abate the nuisance maintained by the defendants as saloon-keepers, and to prevent the city from levying the county from renewing licenses to them. The ground upon which the complaint was based was that the employees of the company, who must necessarily use dynamite and steam in constructing the company's railroad, caused the city and county were induced by the presence of the defendants' saloons along the line of the work to become inflated for use, and thereby caused loss to the corporation by delay in fulfilling the work. The state court ruled against the city and they appealed from the judgment of the supreme court of Washington to the supreme court of Justice Gray, however, for that court, after the judgment of the territorial supreme court, stating that upon one of the grounds advanced by the counsel for the appellant could it maintain action and secure the relief sought.

AS TO THE BELFAST RIOTS.

More Taxes Needed.

LONDON, April 24.—Sir William Vernon Harcourt, chancellor of the Exchequer, introduced a bill today for the coming financial year in the Commons today. The chancellor estimates the expenditure for the current financial year at £289,000,000, leaving a deficit of £1,074,000, due in part to the slight increase in the revenue but chiefly to the vast growth in the expenditure not created by the government but through the demands of the country upon parliament. The chancellor said the government would not propose to cover the deficit by encroaching upon the sinking fund. He preferred to meet the deficit by increased taxation.

Orangeism and Nationalism.

LONDON, April 24.—The conflict between orangeism and nationalism at Belfast, continues intermittently. More than 2000 orange men have been marching about in the procession threatening to attack the nationalists. The military has been kept between the two sides, and will probably prevent their meeting tonight.

AN IDLE FISH FAIR.

The Sheriff National Bank of Moscow, Idaho, had been closed for some time, and the sheriff at once closed the doors. The Moscow National Bank had an attachment for \$25,000, Murphy, Grant and Co. of San Francisco and Allen & Lewis of Portland also secured attachments, running the total up to about \$100,000. More are expected tomorrow, which will increase the liabilities materially. The bank was closed about 10 o'clock, a large book account and the firm's business. The property is mortgaged for \$25,000.

The firm was incorporated for \$100,000. A branch house known as McConnel, Chambers & Co., conducted at the Moscow, Washington, made large purchases of wheat and the firm profited largely thereby. The recent depression in the wheat market, however, is said to have caused heavy losses, and the firm was unable to meet their obligations. In order to save themselves the Pullman company was sold last week and the money derived therefrom came late, however, and the crash came today. It is thought that the firm may pay dollar for dollar. The First National Bank and the Moscow National bank are not affected by the failure.
