

TALK OF THE TOWN.

Attend your Sunday meetings. The sky still remains overcast. Logan will celebrate on the 24th. Go to the Primaries on Monday night. A nice little shower during the night. Mother Brown, of the 14th Ward, is dead. President Joseph Young died at 4 a. m. today. The immigrants arrived last evening as expected. The Weber County Convention occurs on Saturday next. A malignant type of diphtheria has appeared at Centerville. The Peoples County Convention takes place one week from today. Dr. Park and Professor Hardy have been in Cache Valley a week. Home missionaries will attend the city ward meetings to-morrow night. The directors of the D. A. & M. Society hold another meeting to-night. The foundation of the new University building has commenced. It will be of red sandstone. The Supreme Court held a brief session to-day and adjourned till Saturday next, at 10 a. m. The members of the Peoples Party should attend the Primaries in force, on Monday night. The hour is 8 p. m. On Wednesday last, a man had three fingers accidentally sawed off at the E. O. steam mill in Logan Canyon. Beaver will celebrate the 24th. There will be no parade. The exercises will be in a bowery on the Public Square. Alexander Smith, the man who had both his legs cut off in the Ogden railroad accident, the other day, is still living. "Hazel Kirke has had a total run of over 700 nights. Mr. C. W. Coul-dock, the veteran favorite, is with the company. Phil Margotta's benefit, on Monday night, is a very popular theme of conversation. There is sure to be a crowded house. The Chicago Notes is responsible for the following pun on the condition of President Garfield: "He'll Guttenvet it." The only case disposed of in the District Court, to-day, was that of John W. Lowell vs Hans Carlston. Default and judgment as prayed. No decision yet rendered by the Supreme Court in the liquor test case. It is expected that decisions in this, and all remaining cases will be given next Saturday. Robert Russell, who accidentally ran a rusty nail into his foot the other day, died this morning from the effects of lock jaw, induced by the unfortunate mishap. L. R. Ketchum, the noted stock raiser, is in town. He ought to be heard from in regard to the colt races which were matched to be run on the 24th inst. The public ought to know the dates of the proposed trials. Elias Morris, builder, has gone to Montana, to superintend the brick work on the furnaces, stacks, etc., of the Moulton Mining Company, near Butte City. He took a force of nine men with him. G. W. Potter, photographer, formerly of this city, was thrashed in Logan about a week ago by Henry Gray, Jr., for persisting in his attentions to the latter's sister-in-law, contrary to his prohibition. The Enterprise says one of the large circular dial frames in the clock tower of Beaver's new Court House, fell upon the sidewalk last Saturday, and was smashed to smithereens. Two men below narrowly escaped. Among the visitors to Salt Lake to-day, were James A. Thompson and John Farrell, of Eden, Weber County. They are down on business and pleasure combined. Everything prospering in Eden. Health good and crops promising. A horse hitched a little west of the Council House was the cynosure of observation in that vicinity this afternoon. It was fearfully cut up and bleeding badly, as though it had been subjected to an unmerciful flaying. Who was the cruel perpetrator of the deed? About 100 people witnessed the quarter mile dash this morning between John Burns and Charley Little's ponies. The former won easily in 23 seconds, winning \$50. Charley thinks he has a good little plug, and he has, the only trouble being it did not run quite fast enough. A circumstance particularly regretted in the death of President Joseph Young, was that his son, Joseph B. Young, who is expected home to-morrow evening, could not arrive in time to see him alive. The young man is returning from England on purpose to visit his father, and both dotted upon the prospective meeting. Three days ago, however, Uncle Joseph said he should not live to see him.

DEATH OF PRESIDENT JOSEPH YOUNG.

Death of President Joseph Young—Early this morning the report was current of the death of President Joseph Young. It was well founded, the end event occurring about 4 o'clock this morning, at his residence in the 18th Ward. The deceased had reached the advanced age of 84 years, and for the past 8 months had been suffering from vesical trouble. During that time he had been able, occasionally, to attend his meetings and frequently was taken out riding, to visit his brethren in council, etc. He attended the funeral services of his niece, Fanny M. Little, nearly two weeks ago, and delivered there a deeply earnest, interesting discourse, very consolatory to the bereaved friends and relatives. Since then he has not been able to leave his bed, and gradually sank until this morning, when he yielded up with his breath, his spirit to the God who gave it. He passed away without a struggle, without even a gasp, simply ceasing to breathe, and so calmly and peacefully that for some moments his family around the bedside were not aware that he had expired. Uncle Joseph, as he was affectionately termed, was the second of five brothers, sons of John Young and Nabble Howe, and was born on the 7th day of April, 1797, in the town of Hopkinton, County of Middlesex, Massachusetts. He was among the first to receive the gospel, brought to him by his brother, the late President Brigham Young, while he was residing in Canada. He soon afterwards visited the State of Pennsylvania, and was baptized in the town of Columbia. In Kir-tland, Ohio, he was among the first Seventies, ordained February 28, 1835, and was called by the Prophet Joseph to be the first President of all the Seventies, a position which he held from that time till his death. He was a member of Zion's Camp, which went up to redeem Zion in 1834, was at Haun's Mill at the time of the massacre, and barely escaped with his life from that cruel butchery; was among the first settlers of Commerce, afterward called Nauvoo, and helped to build up that beautiful city. He accompanied the exodus of the Saints from that place to Winter Quarters and Council Bluffs, and finally crossed the Plains with ox teams, and arrived in Salt Lake Valley in the year 1850. He has been closely identified with the leaders of the Church for nearly 50 years, and although a quiet and unassuming man, was well known from one end of the Territory to the other. He was beloved by all who knew him, for his virtue, integrity, humility and kindness, his fearlessness in the cause of truth, and his love of God and all good people. After a long life of usefulness, he has passed away to receive the reward of his well doing, leaving a name and example that will endure forever! The funeral will be held in the Salt Lake Assembly Hall, on Tuesday, July 16th, at 11 a. m., under the direction of the Presidency of the Seventies.

UNDER THE WHEELS.

Under the Wheels.—A shocking accident took place in the street immediately in front of this office, this morning shortly after 10 o'clock. A two-horse wagon driven by a man, and loaded down with women and children was proceeding down the road westward, when the driver crossed over the street-track. The wagon suddenly lurched and threw a woman and her infant child out upon the ground. The mother was between the wheels and the child underneath the hind wheel when our reporter arrived upon the scene. The vehicle had stopped in this position, the driver for a few moments either being unable to make the horse move or afraid to do so, lest the woman should be run over. All this time, the poor little child was pressed to the earth beneath the heavy wheel of the loaded wagon while the air was filled with the agonized shrieks of the mother, and the excited cries of the gathering crowd. Finally the wagon was slightly moved and the child taken out. It had evidently gone into a convulsion, its face having darkened while its lips worked spasmodically. A doctor was sent for, but before he could arrive, the mother or took up the babe and directed by the multitude started down the street in quest of medical help. Dr. H. J. Richards was consulted, and after examining the injured child, said that no bones had been broken and that unless some internal rupture had occurred, the little one might recover. It commenced to regain consciousness while the examination was in progress, and the mother, who is a Danish woman, finally went to her home in the Second Ward. She said she had the purpose of meeting some friends among the immigrants who arrived last night. It appears that when the wagon lurched, she was sitting upon a forward stand, was thrown out upon the single trees, where one of her feet caught in the traces, while the front wheel passed over the other ankle. Her babe, in the mean time was separated from her and run over as described. The driver after the accident, coolly drove off heartily, leaving them to the mercies of the populace. They received every care and attention, but this did not justify his action in the premises. Since the above was in type, the child has died from its injuries.
