When Prince Scorge Stops up for the crown then look out for the league, for it has fig-ured by that time the English people will want a change, The royal lady for whom the league has begun an active campaign, and who would have been queen today if the "divine right" of direct descent had net been overborne by the asserted right of the people to choose their own ruler, is the wife of the Crown Prince Louis, of Bavaria. When King Otto, the nominal sovereign of Bavaria, be-came so hopelessly crazy that it was neceasary to put him under guaid, his uncle, Luitpold, became prince regent. THE LEGITIMIST PRINCE OF WALES.

Munich is a favorite resting place with American travelers, and hundreds of readers no doubt will recall the fine, grave face of the princess as she trav-eled quietly through the Munich streets in a in an ordinary carriage, bent probably on some errand of mercy. She will be il on July 2, but has not yet lost her early beauty, in which one can discern some traces of the handsome features of the Stuarts. She was married to Crown Prince Louis Leopold Joseph Marie Aloysius Alfred in 1868, and is the mother of thirteen children, all ex-Cept one of whom are living. The oldthe mother of thirteen children, all ex-cept one of whom are living. The old-est of them, Robert Mary Luitpold Ferdinand, who will be 31 in May, is the Legitimist prince of Wales, and is really expected by some of the more singuine Legitimists to reign over Eng-land some day. some day.

The first names of some of the other children are worth putting down as curlosities. The Princess Royal is Adeigonda, and her youngest six sis-ters are Hildegarda, Nothburga, Wilruda, Helmtruda, Dietlenda and Gondeinda-an imposing set of names re-specifully submitted to the parents of unchristened girl bables in the United States who have been unable to think of any name except Dorothy.

The princess was christened Mary Theresa Henrietta Dorothea and she was born archduchess of Austria-Estewas born archduchess of Austria-Este-Modena. She is descended directly from Mary Stuart, Queen of Scots, James I and the unlucky Charles I, whose head was cut off by Cromwell's orders. Af-ier Cromwell died the throne was res-lored to the son of Charles I, the Charles II, who was about as famous for his fondness for Nell Gwynn as for any other achievement. He left no legitimate chlidren and was succeeded by his brother, who, under the style and title of James II, was a conspicu-ous failure in the king business. His

Perhaps it is hardly fair to the princess to speak of her "claim" to the throne, for she never by word or deed has indicated a desire to oust Queen Victoria. But she knows of the claims that are made on her behalf by the legitimists, and has done nothing to stop them. It can be said in a general way that she is ready to move when-ever it seems best. The new portrait of her presented here is an interesting indication of the fact that she does not discountenance references to her descent. In other works, according to strict genealogy, there are practically 599 per-sons now living who have a better right to the throne by descent than Queen Victoria, and two of these are her great-grandchildren, the little Prince Carol of Roumania and his sister.

It is a striking fact that every crowned head in Europe, with the exception of the kings of Norway and Servia, is descended from Mary Queen of Scots, and from James I. The total number of that unhappy queen's descendants now living is 1,172, and of these the prince of Wales has only one descent from her, whereas Prince Robert, the legitimist
