Was Carefully Planned, Soldiers Warning All Christians to Hang Out Their Ikons.

200 KILLED, 1.000 WOUNDED.

Stores Pillaged and Selling of Loot Openly Countenanced By Army Officers.

No Steps Taken to Prevent Outrages-Many Buildings in Siedlee, Scene of Horror, Are on Fire.

Sieller Sept. 10 .- A Jewish massacre, surgusts in seriousness all previous ones in this vicinity, took place here Saunday and Sunday. It was carefulto planted beforehand, the soldiers saming all of the Christian population in advance to hang out their ikons so gat they might remain undisturbed. Saturiay night some Terrorists killed me soldiers, and thereupon the Libau afment broke forth in unrestrained hr. They began murdering Jews on ser hand and continued their work staughter all night Saturday and 10 day Sunday. The ghastly work of rdering and pillaging continued unsurdering and pinaging contact and it saily this morning, when Gov.-Gen. Sailon telegraphed for permission to use the artillery. Four batteries then evend fire down Pienkna, Warsaw and Alena streets, which were inhabited by housands of Jews. The destruction is borrible. As a result of the gen-ral slaughter, it is estimated that fully 10 Jews have been killed and 1,000 mounded. There are 3,000 prisoners n custody, a great many of whom are wonnded. Not a soldier was killed. This morning a squad of soldiers were parading through the streets selling pillaged watches and jewelry. The army enters openly countenanced the selling The local governor, Englke, took no steps to prevent the outrage. To prevent the outrages, the tele-graph offices are closed, and no perof loot. refugees continue to crowd the sta-tions. The soldiers are drunk and behaving with extraordinary brutality.

#### Negro Tried to Burn Way Out of Jail And Was Cremated.

Chicago, Sept. 10 .- A dispatch to the Tribune from Mineola, Texas, says: In an effert to burn his way out of jali yesterday, Silas Johnson, a negro. lit his own funeral pyre. He was cre mated while a mob surged around the fail watching his fast agonies through iron windows bars, but unable to save

Johnson, when arrested on a drunkiness charge, started a fire in the prison, hoping to burn his way out. The fire got beyond his control and the turnkey could not be found until too late.

A general fire alarm was turned in, and crowds rushed to the burning lockup. Impelled by the screams of the negro, frantic attempts were made to rescue him.

A heavy battering ram was procured. but the iron doors withstood the shocks. Axes and sledge hammers had no more effect, and the crowd was forced to look on and watch the negro burn to death. The town is without adequate fire service, and by the time the small hose was played on the flames, the fire was beyond control. While the negro was crying out in his agony after the last attempt at his rescue, one of the walls of the jail fell in and he was buried beneath the debris,

### CIVIL STRIFE AGAIN THREATENED IN VENEZUELA

New York, Sept. 10 .- The Tribune today says:

Venezuela is again threatened with ivil stirfe.. The man ready to lead the fight against President Castro is his enemy of long standing, Gen. Jose Man-uel Hernandez (El Mocho), formerly formerly Venezuelan minister at Washington, leader of the Conservative party and veteran campaigner. The news was received in this city yesterday that al-ready the general is near the western frontier of Venezuela on Colombian territory prepaing to slike the first blow in an armed conflict that he hopes will dispose President Castro and seat him-

self in the presidency at Caracas. It was only a few months ago that Gen. Hernandez left this city and sailed for Barranquilla, Colombia. When he sailed he gave out that he was in ill health and was going to Colombia to rusticate. It was not long, however, be-fore news came to his friends in this that he was on his way up the Magdalena river, bound for Bogota. It was immediately surmised, and, as lat-

er developments prove, correctly, that his mission was to confer with Presi-dent Reyes of Colombia, who also is not on friendly terms with President Castro.

Gen. Reyes, however, would not give to El Mocho, the material summer which he asked for his insurrection, although it is understood that he granted

### Fifty-Two Bodies Recovered-**Countless Heads of Cattle** Perished.

The Great Avalanche of Earth Broke Loose Without Warning and Swept Down With Disastrous Force.

Tiflis, Sept. 10 .-- Practically without warning the side of a mountain rising above the township of Kwareli broke away and a sea of semi-liquid sand stones and mud swept down on the township and overwhelmed and oblits erated it. Some 255 persons have been buried alive. Fifty-five bodies already have been recovered from the mire, which is six feet deep. In addition to the lives lost, countless head of cattle perished and the crops were destroyed. Kwarell township occupies an area of five kilometers of the district of Telaw, in the Caucasus. Similar disasters are common occurrences in Caucasian valleys.

#### RUSSIA EXPRESSES REGRET FOR ATTACK ON CONSUL.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 10.-The British embassy has received expressions of the government's regret for the attack in Baku, Sept. 8, upon Leslie Urgubart, the British vice consul, and assurances that everything would be done to discover and punish the perpetrators of the act.

Sir Arthur Nicholson, the ambassador, believes the attack upon Mr. Urguhart to have been of a semi-politicat nature and committed by agitators who have been endeavoring to engineer anther outbreak among the workmen in the oil industry. The frustration of this plan was due largely to the energy of Mr. Urguhart.

As far as is possible to learn there have been up to the present time about to persons killed and 200 wounded. Hundreds of Jews are assembling at the railroad station awaiting means of getting out of town, but Siedlee is surrounded by troops who do not permit exit or entrance.

Field guns occupy points of vantage on the principal streets.

There seems no doubt that the terrorists are responsible for provoking the massacre by their fusillades from roofs and windows on Saturday against soldiers and policemen who ere patrolling the streets. The troops surrounded the houses from which this fring came and poured in volleys through the windows and doors. This was followed by a search of the premses, which soon developed into wholesale plundering and subsequently into a massacre and slaughter. The trouble began in Pienkna street and spread dly to a large portion of the town. All the Jewish shops have been looted. Owners who defended their property were killed or wounded. Any person men leaving a house or looking out of a window was shot without mercy.

#### ARTILLERY OPENED FIRE.

Watsaw, Sept. 10 .- Acording to the latest advices received here from Sedice the artillery opened fire at from e'clock this morning. The cannon shots were directed against the buildings from which the terrorists had fired on the soldiers. The sound of the big tuns sent a number of women into a state of hysterical fear. Over 150 Jew-ish shops were looted. Christians essaped the massacre by hanging holg images and crosses to their windows. The soldiers got quite out of hand. Most of the prisoners arrested are Jews and they were beaten without mercy. The Jews of Warsaw are in fear of attack.

#### WOULD-BE SUICIDE PICKED UP IN MID-OCEAN.

New York, Sept. 10 .- The Cunard Line steamer Carpathia which arrived yesterday from Mediterranean ports reports that on the outward voyage on Aug. 9. at \$:30 p. m., a Hungarian in-terpreter jumped overboard.
