

San Francisco's Criminal Statistics.—Chief of Police Crowley, of San Francisco, has filed his annual report with the Board of Supervisors: Among other tnings, the report states that for the fiscal year ended June 30th last 26,104 arrests were made, of which 1,180 were for felonies and the rest for misdemeanors. Of the felony cases, 607 of the accused were dismissed in the police courts, 309 held to answer SHORTLINE of about an acre in extent.
