As this demand was made, it is stated, on two occarions, two indictments were returned. Extortion, declared to have been practised upon Ed Marchand, proprietor of Marchand's restaurant, is the basis of two more indictments. A demand made upon Joe Malfanti, another restaurateur, is the alleged of-fense on which the fifth and last in-dictment was founded.

The indictments were returned for the grand jury by Foreman B. P. Ollver, who presented the documents to Judge Muraskey, who read them and placed them on file. He then proceeded to fix the bail for each charge. In the presentation of the indict-

Heney has fulfilled the promise that the first action taken by the grand jury would be to accuse Abraham Ruef of felony. This prophecy was made in open court two weeks ago, but noth-her was then said that Mayor Schmitz ing was then said that Mayor Schmitz would be drawn into the scandal. The indictment of Ruef was expected by the public, but the people were not pre-pared for immediate direct action against the city's chief magistrate, who against the city's cher magistrate, who is now on the Atlantic returning from a visit to Eurorie. For nearly two years the alleged objectionable rela-tions between the French restaurants and the municipal administration have en a subject of severe criticism and public denunciation.

These restaurants, which were all de-stroyed by the April conflagration, were frequently the cause of bitter assaults from the pulpit and press, the accusa-tions being made that they were inmoral and a menace to the welfare of the community. The so-called res-taurants were a combination of eating ouse, lodging house and liquor resort The agitation for their suppression began years ago, and about two years ago apparently reached the city offi-cials, and orders were issued that they be deprived of licenses, which would close them. The doors remained locked for a short time and then the restaur-nits were permitted to reopen with "some restrictions." Soon the houses were again in full swing along the old lines,

At 7 o'clock tonight Abraham Ruef proceeded in an automobile to the home of Superior Judge Frank J. Murasky, where he surrendered himself to Sheriff Thomas O'Nell, who met Ruef there by appointment. The representative of a surety company accompanied Ruef to Judge Murasky's home, and there qualified for Ruef's bonds, which amount on the five counts is \$56,000. An order of release from custody was then made by the judge.

DAWES COMMISSION.

Charges Filed Against Chairman Bixby And Chief Clerk Beall,

Muskogee, I. T., Nov. 5 .- Webster Ballinger, a Washington newspaper correspondent, filed charges before the senatorial committee tonight against Tams Bixby, chairman, and W. O. Beall, chief clerk of the Dawes commission. Ballinger alleged that these officers were deliberately responsible for the wrongful enrollment as negro freedmen of about 2,000 persons of mixed negro and Indian blood in the Choctaw and Chickasaw nations. These freedmen get only 50 acres of land as against 320 acres of land and participation in tribal funds allowed Indian citizens.

Ballinger told the committee that he desired the enaciment of a mandatory law compelling the Dawes commission to give these persons their full rights

Paris, Nov. 15 .- The semi-official Paris, Nov. 16.—The semi-omcial Temps this afternoon, referring to the speech of the imperial chancellor in the German reichstag yesterday, says Prince von Buelow evidently tried to be amiable, but adds that similar ami-ability has always preceded anti-French campaigns.
