



St. George, Washington Co., Jan, 15.-Rain, rain, rain! There has been a fall of 1.39 inch from Jan. 1 to 15. 1907. In November, 1906, the rainfall was 1.21 inch, and in Docember, 2.45 inches. The total for the year 1906 was 11.08 inches.
The roads between St. George and the railroad and other points are well night impassable. The stores have been umble to get freight, and are entirely out of coal oil, and many of the people have gone to making candles and old-time lights. Wood and coal can scarcely be bought at any price, so shade trees are being cut down. Some were fortunate enough to have a supply of fuel and oil on hand when the bad weather set in. A number of deaths have occurred recently among the children as a result of colds and bronchial troubles. A mass meeting of jeading citizens was held recently, at which was discussed the advisability of putting in a city water system and an electric plant. A preliminary survey, looking to that end is now being made.
The county paper, the Diske Advocate, formerly printed at Cedar City, has suspended publication, leaving the county without a local paper.
