

## ANTE-CONVENTION GOSSIP ON STREET

Indications Are That 500 Democratic Delegates Will Gather At Logan Tuesday.

"WILL UNCLE JESSE RUN?"

Members of the Party Declare That Objections or No Objections They Will Have None Other.

This afternoon a definite statement is being made by Democratic leaders that the convention Tuesday may nominate "Uncle" Jesse Knight for governor without fear of having the nomination rejected if tendered, as a demand from the united party.

All active candidates for governor declare that unless "Uncle Jesse" Knight positively rejects the nomination they are supporting him and are not themselves in the race.

Yesterday it became known that Mr. Knight had held a conference with Judge Whitecotton, a delegate from Provo, and requested him to personally represent him on the floor of the convention, and state that he positively would not accept. Democratic leaders immediately took the matter up and today are intimating that before the convention they can state positively that the nomination will not be rejected after being tendered, although the wish of Mr. Knight decidedly is that it be not tendered to him.

CONVENTION SCHEDULE.  
Monday evening at 8 p. m., reception to southern delegates by Bryan club.

Tuesday, 11:30 a. m., call to order of convention in Logan Opera House, with Judge O. W. Powers as temporary chairman.

Today is a Democratic day along the political rialto, and the one great question of the hour is: "Will Uncle Jesse run?" Democratic leaders, taking note of the sentiment in his favor, are fearful of the start it will give the party to have the convention stampede for him, and then have him refuse the nomination after it is over.

Members of the party declare that objections or no objections, they will have none other, and, in fact, a canvass of the leading aspirants for the nomination found them today urging the name of Jesse Knight and talking of the chances of getting him to run.

The indications today are that the Democratic convention will be attended by over 500 delegates. Lyman R. Martin, state chairman, said this morning that reports from the south were to the effect that a full representation was coming along, and that it would arrive with more enthusiasm than has been evidenced for years.

The arrangements in Logan, he said, have been perfected under a local committee, backed by Frank K. Nebeker, national committee chairman, and the complete, including carriages for the arriving delegates, lunches at noon, and housing accommodations, should the delegates be here over night through a protracted session.

Judge O. W. Powers has been tendered the position of temporary chairman, although the formal meeting of the state committee to choose officials will not be held until tonight in the offices of the state chairman.

At this meeting also the platform will be discussed, and a tentative document will be drawn up in the hope of avoiding protracted debate at Logan. It is desired, if possible, to have the convention adjourn to have the convention special run back to Salt Lake before midnight on Tuesday.

NO FUSION.  
A matter, sometimes suggested, of fusing with the "American" party on the judicial ticket, especially, and possibly on some state candidates, is being strongly opposed by such delegates as could be located along the rialto today. A straight Democratic ticket seems to be the thing most popular with delegates, and it will undoubtedly be put up at Logan.

The convention is certain to be a lively one. If "Uncle Jesse" Knight fails to scorn the nomination, there will be a quick scrambling for places on the state ticket for which takers today are somewhat wary. With the exception of a definite boom of King for Congress, the other offices are not surrounded by a clamorous host of candidates, although many candidates, at present in the receptive mood, would rush into activity upon the announcement that Knight had accepted. Joseph Stringfellow is out for attorney general, and it is thought that various sections of the state will come prepared to launch booms for favorite sons for the other offices.

A state committee meeting tonight will complete all preparatory arrangements for the convention. Two huge crates of campaign literature, received from the east today, were shipped to Logan for distribution during the session on Tuesday.

### AMUSEMENTS.

Theater—The second night of the Carnival and Festival at the Theater drew another good sized audience, although the attendance was largest in the upper regions. Profiting by the experience of the opening night, things went with more rapidity and decision and the final curtain fell on time.

From the artistic standpoint, the results were the strongest yet attained. The "Il Trovatore" sketch was the most finished thing the carnival has presented and Mrs. Emma Ramsey Morris as the gypsy and Mr. Pyper as Manrico, did specially fine work in their duet. Miss Elason made a superb appearance as Leonora and has some excellent high notes, though her evident nervousness interfered with the evenness of her lower register. In the prison scene, Mr. Pyper was again heartily applauded, even though the "Miserere" chorus had to be omitted, and its place taken by the orchestra. The orchestration of the whole number by Mr. McClellan was excellent.

The Mikado number was chiefly attractive for its big male chorus, the march being specially fine. Of the people Mr. Winslow Smith as the Mikado did the best work. The other features included the Gainsborough Sextette, the Norwegian Marriage, the Pocahontas tableau and the Dawn of Christianity, all of which were attractively rendered.

The entertainment at the Theater winds up this afternoon and evening with a repetition of some of the gems of the previous performances, tonight's bill including the highly artistic "Il Trovatore" sketch, "The Bohemian Girl," "Mikado" and "Carmen."

Miss Sybilla Clayton was accorded a big reception and played with her accustomed skill.

An interesting feature of last night's rendition of the Mikado sketch, was the use by the orchestra of the old orchestration made by Prof. Careless when the sketch was first presented here nearly 20 years ago. Prof. McClellan says it was a pleasure to play from the manuscripts, and that the work fully shows Prof. Careless' high degree of musicianship.

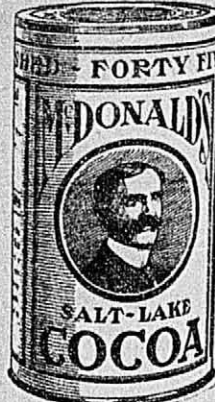
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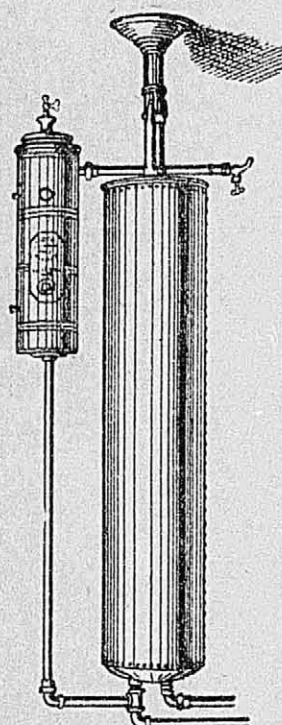
