# IS STARTED UP

Preparations Being Made to Develon the Mine on a Big Scale.

POWER FOR TUSCARORA.

Preparations for sinking have now been resumed and when everything is ready the shaft will be put down another hundred feet. This will enable the immense ore bodies of this old bonanza to be tapped from be neath and will give a big stoping area, that should, when this work is com-pleted, cause the Honerine to make as good a name for itself below the water contact as it has done above.

SHIPMENT FROM THE DEXTER. A Body of Very Rich Sulphurets has been Uncovered.


