He arrived at sitka Sept. 15th and was cordially re ceived save by a very few persons. An increased appropriation for schools is asked. Children are said to manifest more than an average aptitude in study, and the Utes are especially anxious for the establishment of Eng-lish schools. A careful estimate of the population of Southeastern Alaska places the number of whites at 1,900 and natives at 7,000. The native Alaskans are said to be educated to some extent in the elementary branches and to be members of the Greek, Presbyterian and Catholic churches. They are not Indians and differ in appearince, habits, language and other respetts from the Indians of the United states. The Governor dwells at considerable length upon the great natu-ral resources of Alaska and severely arraigus Government agents who have represented the country as inclement to a degree that precludes cultivation or the keeping of domestic animals. Never, he says, in his home travels from Lake Superior to the Gulf of Mexico has he seen a more luxriant regetation than in Southeastern Alas-ka, or hardler vegetables. All grow to maturity and to an enormous size, and the cattle are sleek and in the best possible condition. The gold mines on lougias Island opposite Juno, are in full operation.
