They sat down to dinner, and the old gentleman according to custom, commenced saying grace, but the captain, whose attention had been diverted for the moment, hearing the old gentleman speak, thought he was addressing him, and turned to him with, "What did you say, Squire?" "Why, d—n it man, I'm saying grace!"

A remarkable birth of united twins took place in England recently. The children were the daughters of the wife of a respectable mechanic, aged 23, who has been married twelve months. She was always a person of nervous and excitable temperament, and these were her first children. They were born without life. They were united by a band of flesh and cartilage, five inches in breadth, and extending from the upper part of the chest to the navel. They were fully developed, and their united weight was eight and a half pounds. One was sixteen inches long, and the other was half an inch taller.
