BANNER SHEEP AND WOOL STATE

Wyoming's Big Crop in 1908 Places Her at Head Of Union.

WOOL OUTPUT 12,120,000 LBS

Heavy Falling Off in Cash Returns Due to Reduced Prices Of Wool,

Cheyenne, Wyo,, Nov. 24 .- Unless all signs fail, Wyoming will again lead all other states and territories in 1908 in the matter of wool production. Last year Wyoming passed Montana, which led for many years, and became the panner sheep and wool state of the Union, although Montana was not entirely shorn of honors, for, while Wyoming produced 2,817,000 pounds more wood in the grease, the Montana fleeces aggregated 539,560 pounds more scoured Montana received for her wool \$7,640,278, as against \$7,211,773 received by Wyoming for her 1907 clips. Mon-tana then, while being second to Wyoming in her production of wool in the grease, retained first place in production of scoured wool, and also first place for the total value of the annual

But this season Wyoming has undoubtedly passed Montana in the mat-ter of production of scoured wool, as well as in the grease, and this state will also receive for the clip a sum considerably in excess of that obtained by Montana for her 1908 wool.

The state board of sheep commissioners of Wyoming, which annually conducts a shearing pen inspection, at which accurate figures on the numbe of sheep shorn, average weight of ficece, etc., are obtained, will shortly issue its annual statement. This will show that during the season of 1908 approximately 4,510,300 sheep were shorn; that the fleeces averaged eight pounds in weight, and that the season's clip, in the agregate, amounted to approximately 38,000,000 pounds. The wool was much heavier in 1908 than in 1907, the fleeces last year averaging 7.5 pounds each, but the shrinkage is the same-68 per cent.

Wyoming's wool clip for the year 1908 after being scoured aggregated 12,120,000 pounds, and sold at an average of 49 cents per scoured pound, returning to the Wyoming flockmasters a sum aggregating \$5,938,800, or \$1,272,973 less than was obtained from the scoured to the total of the second state of the second state of the second se product in 1907, when \$7.211,773 was obtained for 10,763,840 scoured pounds. A heavier tonnage was marketed this year, than last, but the greatly reduced prices obtained for the product caused a big loss to the growers, or approximately \$1.250.000

inately \$1,250,000.

In addition to the heavy losses sustained because of the greatly reduced prices for wool, the Wyoming flockmasters also lost heavily in the annual lamb crop, which did not exceed 57 per cent on the average, as against cent on the average, as against 12 per cent in 1907. A prolonged drouth, followed by unusually severe spring storms, caused some losses of ewes, and a heavy loss of lambs. In some instances an increase of less than 10 per cent was obtained, while in many others, of course, the increase was at or above normal. Some sections of the state suffered more than others, depending upon the time of lambing. The early and late lambing was all right, pending upon the time of familing. The early and late lambing was all right, but from May 1 to May 15 lambing was attended by frightful losses, and these losses occurred in sections that for many years have obtained an increase of from 75 to 90 per cent. In 1907 there were 2,212,958 ewes with lamb, and an increase of 1,593,329 lambs was obtained. During the past spring there were 2,-480,665 ewes with lamb, and the increase amounted to 1,413,979 lambs or 179,350 less lambs than were obtained in 1907, although there were 267,707 more ewes with lamb at the beginning of the season of 1908 than at the beginning of the season of 1907. A conservative estimate of the loss to the flockmasters of the state through the disastrous lambing of 1908 places the figures at \$1,431,171, and this does not represent the difference in price between the 1907 and the 1908 lambs. Last year's lambs brought fully 75 cents more on the average than did those sold the present season. In brief, had the flockmasters obtained the same per centage of lambs obtained the same per centage of lambs in 1908 they did in 1907, and had they obtained the same prices as in the previous year, they would have received \$1,676,463 more than was actually obtained for the 1908 lamb crop. The \$1,676,463 then represents the loss to the Wyoming sheepmen in the lamb crop alone, and this sum, added to the loss of \$1,272,973 on the annual clip, makes a total of \$2,394,435, which sum is the difference between the aggregate the difference between the aggregate sum obtained for both wool and mutton in the year just closing as compare with 1907. 


