#### All He Wants to Do is to Win the Fight and Then Retire Again -Local News,

New York, March 12.-There will be a hitch in the Jeffries-Fitzsimmons nght if it is awarded to San Francisco promoters, and they wish to pull it off in April instead of May, as called for by the articles of agreement, says the World. It has been intimated that th date might be brought forward in or der to catch the racing season.

Fitzsimmons wanted three months to train for the fight, and when articles were signed Feb. 15, the date was set at May 15. In regard to the proposed change Fitzsimmons is quoted as say ing

"Not for me. I am going to be in condition for this fight and I am not going to cut one week of what I think is the proper training to suit anybody. I am going to win and then I am going to retire and die the champion.

"If it is a question of money for a chance to win the fight I will throw away the money before I will throw away my chances."


