It is no uncommon spectacle to behold a human being assailed by misfortune. Our eyes are pained by the sight every day. We see its manifestations in mourning garments, and in faces draped in the expression that tells of the heart's unuttered sorrows, or in which false smiles are but the gauzy veils that, far from answering their purpose, but make the dark despair they were meant to hide more painfully apparent. And still there is something new and startling in the details of every new misfortune, and in its effects upon different individuals. Adversity has been looked upon as a test of character; it brings to light its deformity, and develops its perfection; or, like chemistry, it displays the hidden poison that unsuspected has destroyed all that was beautiful and gracious in the moral life, or produces a benign and active combination of traits of goodness that waited only for its permeating influence.

Every person of ordinary observation must have remarked that misfortunes often follow in quick succession when once an individual has become their victim.
