CLUB CHAT.

The Society of American Women London is prepared to push its sche London is prepared to push its scheme of establishing scholarships for Ameri-can women in English women's col-leges. Thousands of circulars, it is said, are being sent to women's cluis throughout the country, as well as its colleges and state universities. A dei-egate from the societly, which is an honorary member of the general fedar-ation of women's clubs will present the egate from the society, which is an honorary member of the general feder-ation of women's clubs, will present the plan at the St. Paul biennai. If is fairly safe to predict that the biennai will pass the usual polite resolution, but will not assume responsibility for the plan. American club women have a great many things to do in their own country. They support many scholar-ships in various parts of the country. In fact, there is not a state in the Union where the club women have not done something in aid of public school work. A lengthy account of the school work. A lengthy account of the school work. A lengthy account of a state federation trude school in New York may reasonably be used against the scholarship plan of the London society. The general federation is not equipped for such work. It is a shifting body. The general federation has no machinery for establishing permanent funds for any purpose. It is not, when all is said, an initative body, but an admin-istrative one.
