CAPTAIN SHOOTS HIMSELF.

The captain, insane from drink, then nstantly placed the muzzle of the gun to his head, just over the right ear, and fired his third and last shot. He dropped to the ground with the bullet in his brain, and instantly expired.

LIEUTENANT'S WOUNDS SLIGHT. The shots alarmed the post, and Capt,

and Adjutant B. H. Wells, whose quar-ters are No. 15, was immediately on the spot with the sentries who were within hearing, and the prostrate men taken in charge, and Surgeon Major Smith hurriedly summoned. Captain Raibourn was found to be dead, and Lieut. Point, on being removed to his quarters, was fortunately found to have sustained only superficial flesh wounds. It was not necessary even to take him to the hospital, and he is being cared for at his quarters.

COURSE OF THE FATAL BULLET.

The body of Captain Raibourn was removed to the hispital building, where a hurried autopsy revealed the course of the bullet, which was found lodged against the left interior wall of the skull. The sad event caused a profound gloom to spread over the post, and soldiers who chanced in town during the day volumed to the body in the the day, refused to talk about it.
