Border Union Introduces a Resolution Demanding the Recall of Ambassador Bayard.

The debate met at 5 o'clock. Prayer was offered by Senator Barnes, of New York. The reading of the minutes was again dispensed with, as no one of them had been reached the clerk's desk. A series of announcements were offered to the house, guaranteeing the effectiveness of the measure. These, after a lengthy explanation on the part of Senator Chamberlain, were declared valid, whereupon 250 copies of the rules as finally adopted were ordered printed to be sent to those already put in print.

Speaker Glen Miller, Salt Lake, moved that the following be added to the list of the Senate standing committees: Labor, seven members; live stock, five members. Carried.

Whereas, Thomas F. Bayard, an ambassador of the United States to Great Britain, on account of his conduct in public meetings in the empire in which he is serving, has descended from the dignity of his American office, and is cast adrift, without a home or a place of refuge among the people, the United States Government, in view of his conduct, has withdrawn its protection and its official recognition of his country.

And whereas such conduct by him in violation of every sanitary and social duty should condemn the instances of sedition concerning that now exists and is a direct encouragement to the proslavery sentiment of Europe and of the world, and to the entire world, signs upon the cause of the people.

And whereas it is the duty of our nation and all its servants to stamp out every effort for the spread of liberty and for the safety of the people, and of a thousand ways by an existing party to do this, we can serve the path of our duty, therefore, be it

Moved by the Senate, the House concurred, and Mr. Bayard, having expressed his sentiments of disapprobation of the conduct of Thomas F. Bayard, announced his withdrawal, and so, most respectfully say that he is entitled to a country to which the grandeur of its institutions.
