NEW YORK.

Strong Advice.

NEW YORK, 19.—The county convention of delegates of the reform Democrats have held a meeting, about four hundred delegates present. W. W. Curtis warned the meeting that Tammany intended frauds at the election, and said the only remedy was to execute summary justice by suspending reporters or fraudulent inspectors from the polls, and he advised the people to avoid protected citizens in doing the following nominations were made: for judge of the supreme court, ex-judge George C. Barrett; for judge of common please, Judge Charles H. Daly; register, general Franz Seigel.

SYRACUSE, 19.—The public school building No. 7, one of the largest in the city was burned this evening; loss \$12,000, insurance \$5,000. It was doubtless the work of an incendiary. A colored girl now under arrest confessed to having attempted to fire the building last evening.

LOUISIANA.

Houma.—Explosion.
NEW ORLEANS, 19.—A bank box, containing about \$50,000 worth of securities, was stolen to-day.

A wagon load of Union torpedoes, part of a lot being unloaded from the ship Geo. Hurstout, from New York, exploded on the street this morning. The driver was killed instantly and several passers by were injured. The windows in the vicinity were shattered by the concussion, and one house, a shop, was demolished. The vessel, which has two hundred cases still on board, will probably be ordered off.

BOSTON, 19.—Washburn has written to Hovey, assenting the Republican nomination for governor.

MAINE.

Earthquake.
AUGUSTA, 19.—Quite a severe shock of earthquake was felt here at 4:40 p.m. this afternoon, lasting ten or twelve minutes.

Leavenworth and Denver R. R.
LEAVENWORTH, 19.—Camps for graduations on the Leavenworth and Denver railroads. R. R. have been established some distance west of here, and the contractors expect to make surprising speed. Dan Casement's name, of U. P. fame, has been engaged on the work.

Detroit, 19.—Intelligence has been received here of the picking up of two men boats of the steamer Colburn, with eighteen persons. Twenty persons are still missing. Gilbert Demont and Indian agent Smith, and wife, of Detroit, are undoubtedly among the lost, as also were all the women on board.

INDIANA.

More Fire.
INDIANAPOLIS, 19.—The fire this afternoon at Brownsville, Ind., destroyed six houses and three dwellings, with a loss of \$15,000 or \$20,000; insurance paid.

WISCONSIN.

The Fire Field—Horrible scenes of destruction.
Milwaukee, 19.—The County Advo-
cates report a full account of the loss of life and property by the great fire, to Sunday night. Forty-eight fires had been raging through the towns of Brussels, Union, Gardner, Forestville, Wykawha, Narrows, Sturgeon bay, and Savastopol, burning fences and timber, but leaving houses untouched. At 1 a.m. of Sunday, a fiery tornado swept down from the south-west, beginning at the Belgian settlement in Brussels, sweeping through the towns of Gardner, Union, and the western part of Savastopol, down to East Shore, and every building in its path was consumed. At William's shingle mill everything was burned, and a new awful destruction of human life ensued. Out of eighty persons at the mill, fifty-seven were burned to death. The few survivors tell a horrible tale of the scene. After the fire had passed, no bodies were found in a potato patch in the center of the clearing. There were many mangled in a terrible manner. This destruction was but the work of a few minutes, and was the same as the tornado that burned up Peotone in less than a hundred human beings. A number of other losses of life are reported in other places. Twenty-two

in the town of Brussels suffered the like fate. There is scarcely a house or barn standing in the line of this fire. Efforts for aid are not spared and donations from abroad are coming along just in time to make comfortable those who have survived. Contributions in money can be sent to Alex. ST. PAUL, 19.—Gen. Leman, arrived from Fort Garry, last evening, reports the excitement in Winnipeg on account of the recent discovery at Lake Shabodowin. Specimens of gold, quartz, and quartz have been brought to Winnipeg, and hundreds were rushing to the new gold field. Lake Shabodowin is a short distance from Silver Lake.

General Curley, one of the leaders of the late Fenian fiasco upon Manitoba, arrived here yesterday and was immediately arrested. Like O'Neill, who was arrested here on Monday, he declares the Fenian raid was no raid at all, but merely a colonization scheme, and the colony could have successfully resisted Colonel Wheaton if so disposed.
