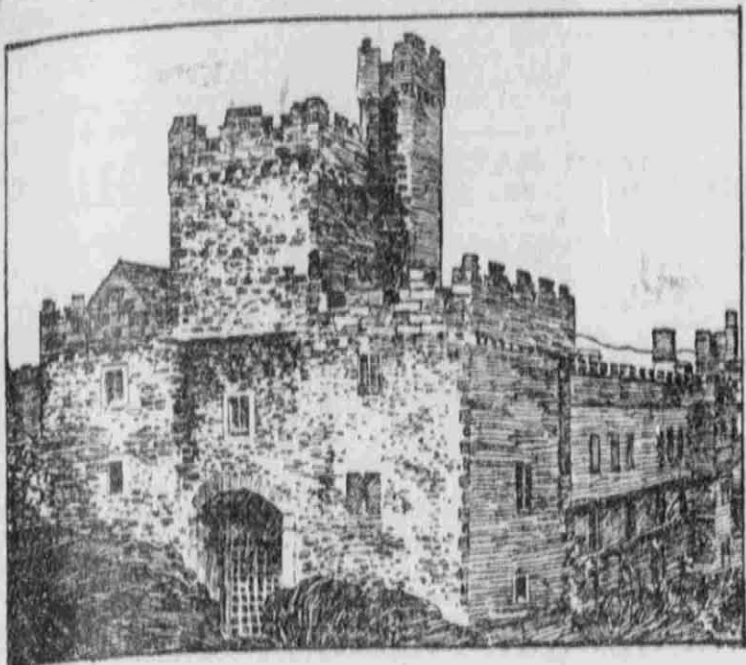
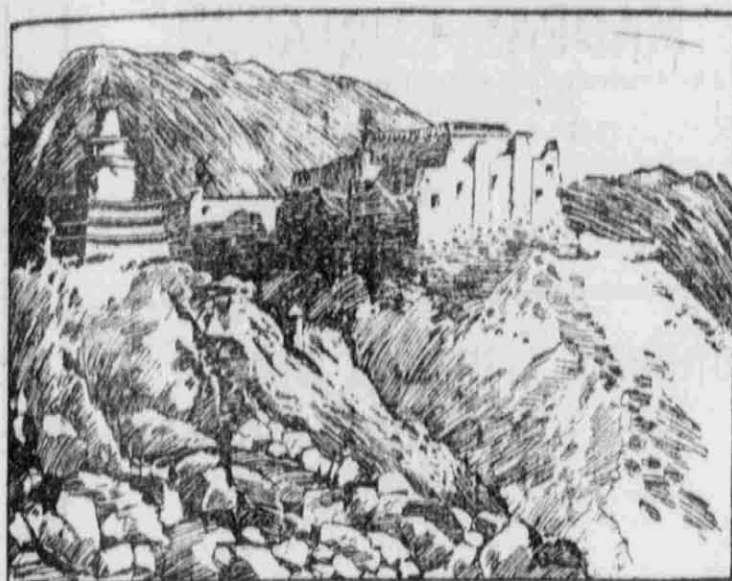


EAGLE TOWER OF HADDON HALL.



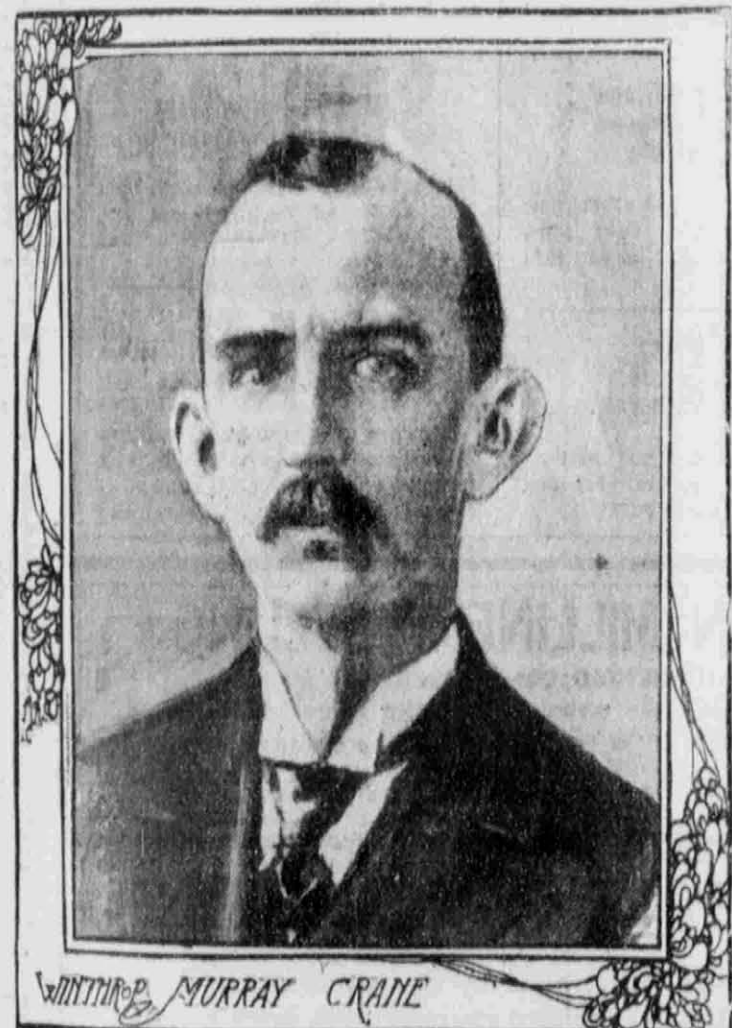
Haddon Hall, the well known home of Dorothy Vernon, is a fine specimen of an English baronial mansion in Derbyshire. It was built in the early part of the twelfth century and passed into the hands of the Vernon family. By the romantic marriage of Mistress Dorothy to Sir John Manners it became the ancestral seat of the Rutland line. The building is very large and incloses two courts. It combines the late Norman with the renaissance style of architecture and is one of the best examples of the combination to be found in all England. The view herewith presented is not the one commonly given and will be found interesting on that account.

THE TIBETAN MONASTERY OF KANMA.



This sketch was made by a member of the British expedition recently sent into the forbidden land of Tibet. The curious structure, half fortress and half convent, like so many of the religious establishments of this remarkable country, is perched on the summit of a mountain and is to be reached only by secret and subterranean passages. The lamas who design these almost inaccessible retreats are so imbued with the spirit of exclusiveness that the entrance to these aerial hermitages are known to only a few persons, and intercourse with the outer world is carried on by means of baskets let down from the height to receive the contributions of the faithful. Some of these monasteries have resisted the English explorers and have been regularly besieged.
