

CHARGES AGAINST FEDERAL JUDGES

Rep. Murphy Introduces Resolution
for Investigation of Judges
Phillips and McPherson.

CHARGES RATHER CAPTIOUS.

They Are Said to Have Gone Fishing
With Certain Railroad Attorneys
—Decisions Carped At.

Washington, May 3.—Making serious charges against Federal Judges John F. Phillips and Smith McPherson of the Western district of Missouri, Representative Murphy of that state introduced a resolution today to investigate their conduct in the litigation between the state and railroad companies over the maximum freight law and to the Missouri 2-cent passenger rate law.

The preamble of the Murphy resolution claims the two judges accompanied certain railroad attorneys on a fishing trip, on which occasion members of the party were arrested for violating the game laws of the state. The resolution charges that Judge Phillips neglects his duty by continued absence from the bench and that when he does preside the court is in session for only four hours each day. Mr. Murphy desires the general conduct of Judge Phillips investigated, contending that he is insulting to the attorneys who are compelled to practice in his court and also that he has at various times instructed the jury to bring in a certain verdict. If the jurors bring in a different verdict, declares the resolution, Judge Phillips becomes insulting and practically charges that they have violated their oaths as jurors.

The resolution cites the various phases of the litigation, including a statement that the railroad companies agreed to establish certain rates within the state of Missouri in violation of the state anti-trust law. It is stated that the two judges rendered certain decisions which in effect usurped the legislative powers of the general assembly.

MC PHERSON'S STATEMENT.

Kansas City, Mo., May 2.—Judge Smith McPherson was found tonight on a Wharsh train at Stanberry, Mo. in answer to a request for a statement he said:

Your message was the first that I have known of a resolution in Congress today concerning Judge Phillips and myself. Not only was your message the first I have heard of such a resolution, but it is the first that I have heard of any man by the name of Murphy from Missouri. Whatever his reason may be and whoever is Murphy, he is both without harm to either Judge Phillips or myself.

"What I have done in the Missouri rate cases was done in the broad daylight of the court with my conclusions at the end of the hearing reduced to writing, now on file with the clerk of the United States circuit court of Kansas City. They were widely distributed to the press by the Associated Press on March 8.

"Your message does not inform me of the nature of the resolution, therefore I cannot go into detail. Whatever they may be my sleep will not be disturbed. I will gladly make any statement after I have read the resolutions.

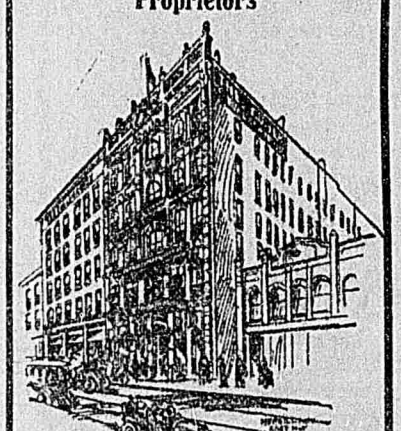

ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF KIDNAPING AND MURDER

New York, May 4.—Believing that
kidnapers killed 7-year-old Antonio
Malfetti, and threw his body into the
East river on discovering that no re-
ward would be paid for his recovery,
the Brooklyn police last night arrested
two men on suspicion. Antonio disap-
peared March 14, and his body was re-
covered in the river two days later.

On two different occasions following
the disappearance of the boy, two
strange men, foreigners, called on the
lad's mother and questioned her con-
cerning the case, asked her how much
money she had in the bank, and if she
had decided to offer a reward for the
recovery of her son.

When the body was found there were
indications, according to the police,
that the boy had been frightfully beat-
en, and that he had been thrown
thrown in the water. This, and the
fact of the visits of the two men to
the Malfetti home led the police to in-
vestigate, and while detectives were at
the house last night, the two men, stran-
gers to the family, called. On the sugges-
tion of the dead boy's relatives they
were taken into custody. The parents
of Antonio believe that when the kid-
napers found that they were unable
to pay a reward, they killed the boy
and threw him into the river.

BOLT IN THE BOILER.

Caused Crippling of One of Turbines
Of Cruiser Salem.

Quincy, Mass., May 4.—The builders
of the turbine scout cruiser Salem have
issued a statement that they have
caused the United States government to in-
vestigate the cause of the crippling of one
of the turbines on the war vessel.

An iron bolt which had no connec-
tion with the turbine and which was
not employed in that part of the vessel,
was found in the engine. It was this
that hampered the buckets flat and
practically crippled the cruiser.

Commander F. A. Bailey of the New
York navy yard, has arrived here to
make the investigation in behalf of the
government.

"We can only account for the pres-
ence of the bolt in the boiler, by saying
that it was put there by malicious per-
sons."

"We have made four or five examina-
tions of the Salem's turbine. Last Sat-
urday we made further investigation of
both port and starboard turbines.
When we opened the port turbine, we
found a bolt which caused considerable
suspicion. That grade of bolt was never
used in constructing the turbine.

COLLEGE OF IDAHO.

Caldwell Institution Gets \$25,000 from
Dr. D. K. Pearsons.

Chicago, May 4.—Dr. D. K. Pearsons
benefactor of small children has made
the first of his promised donations of
the year. He has given \$25,000 to the
college of Idaho, at Caldwell. This was
contingent upon the institution raising
\$75,000 additional. The requirement
was met largely through the effort
of Miss Julia E. Finney, a teacher in
the college, who interested Dr. Pear-
sons in its progress and worked dili-
gently to raise the amount.

BORAH FAVORS INCOME TAX

Idaho Senator Declares That Ex-
travagance Has Become Al-
most a National Disease.

HE WANTS GREAT BIG NAVY.

And a Huge Army—With Tax Would
Build Them Up So as to Cover
Nations of the Earth.

Washington, May 3.—Declaring that
extravagance has become almost a na-
tional disease, Senator Borah today ar-
gued for an income tax as a means for
wiping out the deficit in the treasury
as well as awakening public interest in
national expenditures.

He said the tax which he proposed
should be used to build up a great navy
and a great army for the purpose of
covering the nations of the earth, but
that the burden of taxation should be
taken from those who dig the earth and
put upon the shoulders of those who
would never miss it.

"I believe in an income tax," said Mr.
Borah, "not that we may impose the
whole burden of government upon the
rich or upon wealth, but that wealth
may bear its just proportion of that
burden which it does not do under a
system of taxation resting entirely upon
consumption. Every system of taxation
resting upon consumption should be
supplemented with an income tax, not
alone for the purpose of raising extra
revenue but for distributing the burden
of whatever revenue is necessary more
equitably and more in accordance with
the ability to pay."

Mr. Borah asserted that the income
tax gauges itself according to a man's
success or failure. He said it reaches
the income of the professional man,
who may now escape almost entirely.
Declaring that it was no more an in-
centive to perjury or fraud than the
personal tax laws in the various states,
Mr. Borah claimed that the income tax
was no more insupportable than the sys-
tem of national taxation of today. He
referred to the recent smuggling cases
in New York.

Mr. Borah, asserting that extrava-
gance has become almost a national dis-
ease, said: "It permeates the home, it
permeates college and church, it per-
meates society and it is rife in every de-
partment of government. It has reached
the point of criminality. It is a dis-
ease of the blood and you can not
cure it, like appendicitis, by cutting it
off. You will have to rehabilitate the
system. This will take time and a great
deal of attention and immediate per-
sistence of purpose. In other words,
you will never do it until public opinion
is thoroughly aroused."

Mr. Borah referred to former Presi-
dent Roosevelt as having shaped the
principles of the Republican party, and
said that without his leadership "this
party would have gone out of business."

He added that "without continued
adherence to these principles the party
will go out of power."

"No man," he added, "is politically
so short-sighted or potically so blind
as the man who thinks the steamer
Hamburg carried away the policies, the
principles, the public interest, that
aroused public conscience and the
searching public concern which this re-
markable man bequeathed to his coun-
trymen."

This statement was in connection with
a discussion of Mr. Roosevelt's sugges-
tion favoring a graduated inheritance
and graduated income tax.

Mr. Borah also quoted Mr. Taft's
speech in which he spoke in favor of
the income tax.

"Does the senator believe," Mr. Suth-
erland asked, "that President Taft be-
lieved in the constitutionality of the in-
come tax law in other words, that
he believed that the law pronounced
unconstitutional by the supreme court
was in fact constitutional?"

"I only know what he said to the
American people when he was a candi-
date for president," responded Mr.
Borah; "that he favored an income tax
which could be drawn to be made con-
stitutional. I am not willing to believe
that the president believed in drawing
an income tax law applicable to men
tolling in professions, and then in ex-
empting the vast accumulated wealth
of this nation from taxation."

GIRL VICTIMS OF DAYTON MURDER FIEND; MAN ACCUSED OF CRIMES AND HIS HOME



The arrest at Dayton of Elmer Carr
on a charge of arson has been followed
by a statement made to the authorities
by Mrs. Carrie M. Middlestetter, who
lived with Carr, in which she charges
him with the murder of Mary Forech-
ner and Lizzie Fullhart, whose mysteri-
ous deaths, attended by fiendish brutal-
ity, excited the people of Dayton last January. Mrs. Middlestetter, whose association with Carr led her husband to
leave her, declares that Carr not only murdered the two girls, but committed many other attacks on women, and
confessed to her that before he came to Dayton he had killed a young girl in Boston, N. Y., under circumstances
similar to those which befell the two Dayton girls. Carr, she says, is an ex-convict, having served a term in Sing
Sing. Mrs. Middlestetter says it was Carr's custom to go out at night disguised and attack women, and that he
boasted of his crimes to her. Mary Forechner, 15 years old, was murdered near her home and her body dragged to
an old barn. The murder aroused Dayton, and at the height of the excitement a few days later Lizzie Fullhart, 15
years old, disappeared, and her mutilated body was found in a dystem.
