

CLIPPINGS.

—A man in Boston is exhibiting a new invention by which he makes boots in fifteen minutes.

—A letter from London says: "Nautical men here express very discouraging opinions in regard to the Great Eastern. They think it doubtful whether she will ever make another sea trip, and think that, after remaining awhile at Milford Haven, she will be converted into a bath house or a floating hospital."

—A prisoner was lately discovered in the Queen's Bench Prison, London, who had been confined 50 years for debt. He had a life interest in a small property, but received nothing from it since his incarceration in 1814. He said he owed no man anything, and did not wish to be liberated.

—Nine thousand persons have this year visited Chamouix, on the Alps. Of these 4,168 were from England and America.

NOTES.

Proposals must be to carry the mail with "celerity, certainty, and security," using the terms of the law, and they must be guaranteed by two responsible persons, certified to as such by a postmaster or judge of a court of record.

No pay will be made for trips not performed, and for each of such omissions not satisfactory explained three times the pay of the trip may be deducted. For arrivals so far behind time as to break connexion with depending mails, and not sufficiently excused, one fourth of the compensation for the trip is subject to forfeiture. Fines will be imposed, unless the delinquency be satisfactorily explained, for neglecting to take the mail from or into a post office; for suffering it to be injured, destroyed, robbed, or lost; for refusing, after demand, to convey the mail as frequently as the contractor runs, or is concerned in running vehicles on the route. The Postmaster General may annul the contract for violation of the post office laws, or for disobedience of the instructions of the department. He may alter the schedule, and also order an increase of service by allowing therefor a pro rata increase on the contract pay. He may also curtail or discontinue the service in whole or in part, at pro rata decrease of pay, allowing one month's extra compensation on the amount of service dispensed with. Bids should be addressed to the "Second Assistant Postmaster General," superscribed "Proposals Territory of Utah," and sent by mail.
