

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THEATRICAL.**—"The Lady of Lyons" was performed yesterday evening for the second time this season and met with general favor. Madame Scheller's Pauline is a masterly piece of acting and Mr. McKenzie played with great force. The other characters were all creditably rendered.

**A CHANGE.**—Mr. Bassett, Superintendent of the Telegraph line called in to-day and requested us to make the public acquainted with the following changes, in the names of places, which have been mutually agreed upon for the facilitation of business by the Post Office, Telegraph Office and Wells, Fargo & Co. Hereafter the place hitherto called Weber Station will be called Echo City; while Bear River Station, as well, in future, be called Gilmer. This change has been made for the convenience of the offices named, and has been rendered necessary by the many places in those localities that have been called "Weber" or "Bear River Station," which has given rise to much confusion and many mistakes. All who may hereafter send parcels, letters or messages to either of these places should, to avoid mishaps, notice the change and govern themselves accordingly.

**SCHEMERS AT LARAMIE CITY.**—We clip the following from the Frontier Index of the 21st inst.

"Fifteen shots were exchanged on the 18th inst., between two policemen and two individuals charged with robbery. The police report that the two desperadoes walked off with a man whom they learned had \$125 in his pocket, and that they played police by taking the man to the calaboose after he had been robbed. The funds, fastened the door and attempted to go on their way rejoicing, but were followed by the police to the front of the Frontier House, when an arrest was attempted, which resulted in a running shooting match, across the vacant lots intervening, in the direction of the railroad water tank. Charles Harvey, said to be a brother of the key saloon man, was wounded in the left leg, left side and left arm, and instead of being put in the lock-up was taken to the doctor. The other robber, McCleary, was captured after being hammered over the head with a revolver, and was put where he and Harvey had put the \$125 man. None of the police wounded several spectators had close calls from artificial bombs being exploded Sunday morning. It was discovered that McCleary had escaped, and after being tracked to Fort Sanders, was brought back and put under guard of the 125 dollar man. The guard fell asleep and the prisoner effected a successful escape. It is suggested that as the 125 dollar man was fastened in the hog pen calves with a chip, might the imprisoned robber not have removed the frail fastening with greenbacks?"

**CHICKENING.**—Brother H. F. Petersen writing from Fort Ephraim, says in reference to the Indian and grasshopper wars with which the people in that locality have been troubled, that in the former they have been invariably the losers, but in fighting the "hoppers" they have been more fortunate. The following was the mode of warfare adopted by them: When the enemy made their first appearance all who could walk were called to the fight. The people were divided into companies with a captain over each, and then the war commenced and was continued until hundreds of bushels of the locust tribe were slain. The result is that they have prospect of an abundant harvest. It is very cheering to hear of such a relentless enemy meeting more than his match somewhere, and we sincerely trust that our friends at Sanpete will reap the reward such perseverance merits in full bins and an abundant supply of all kinds of provisions.
