FORTY-SEVENTH CONGRESS.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 7.—The House

declared its intention regarding the

death of the late Senator.

Consideration of the District of

Columbia appropriation bill occupied

the remainder of the day, and was

not completed. The total amount

to be appropriated is \$2,367,767.

After the executive session the

Senate adjourned.

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 7.—Sparks

apologized to Cox for remarks made

yesterday while the debate on the

deficiency bill was going on, and

Cox accepted the apology in good

feeling.

White desired to call up for pre-

sent consideration the report of the

ways and means committee upon

its resolution calling for information

relative to the conduct of Commis-

sioner Haun, recommending the

message and the bill to be sent

to the Senate for its consideration.

The Speaker replied the report had

not yet come from the printer, and

White suggested it would not

come back until the whiskey ring let

it, but subsequently disclaimed any

intention of reflecting on the Public

Printer by that remark.

The House then went into com-

mittee and resumed the consideration

of the general deficiency appropria-

tion bill.

Sparks, of Illinois, moved to strike

out the clause appropriating \$400,000

for army transportation for the

fiscal year of 1881, and \$500,000

during the fiscal year of 1882. He

believed the late Quartermaster Gen-

eral had been honest, but remiss, and

never made a suitable attempt to

obtain cheaper transportation.

Butterworth spoke of the great

services and indefatigable industry

of Major and Sparks' motion was

rejected.

Holman, of Indiana, moved to

strike out the clause appropriating

\$125,000 for the payment for army

transportation lawfully due such

and grant railroads as have not re-

ceived aid in government bonds.

Townsend, of Illinois, supported

the motion and contended the land

grant roads (especially instances the

Southern Pacific) had received

aid, enough for the government

without being paid as large a

sum as contemplated in the bill. He

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
