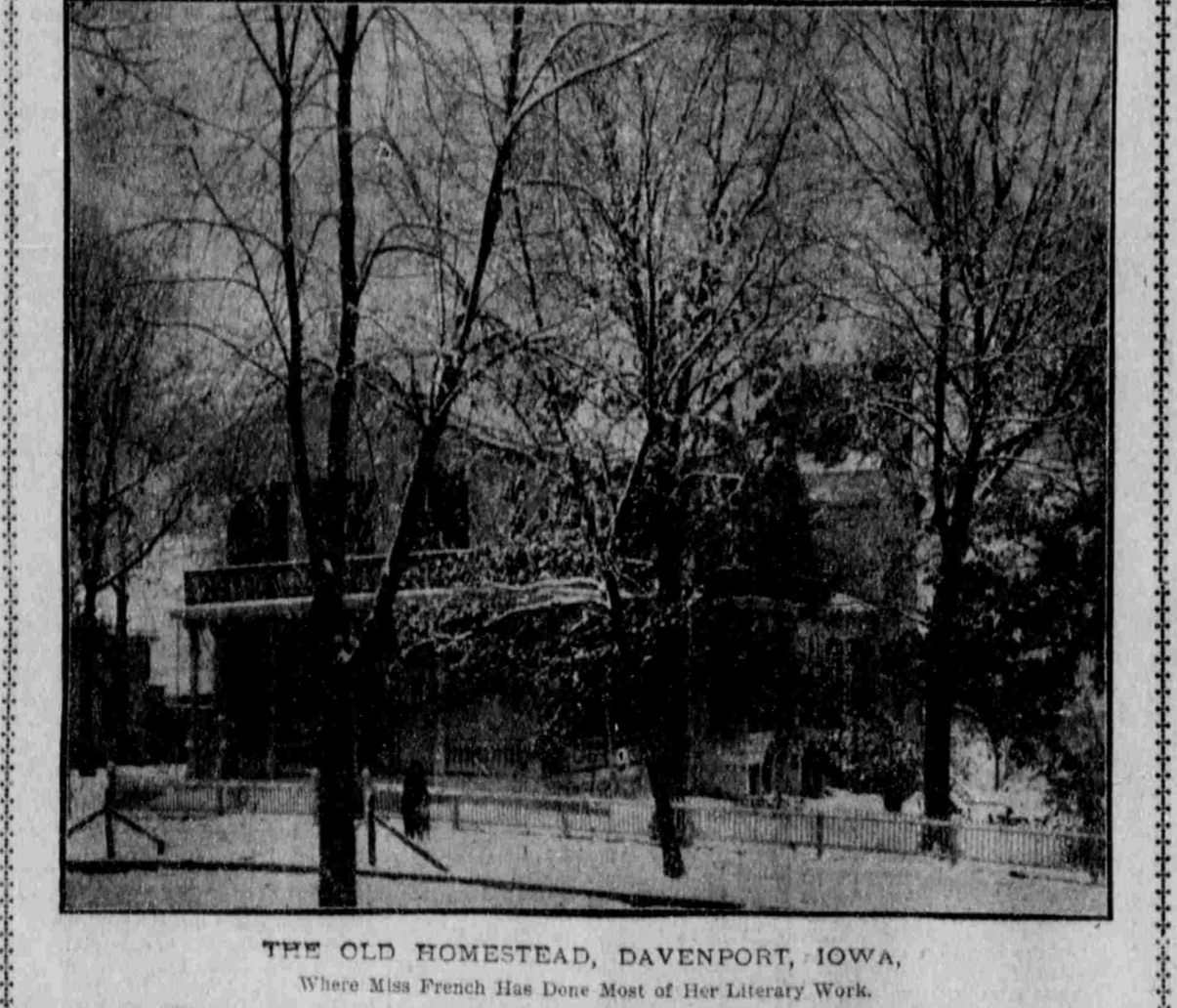
"OCTAVE THANET" TALKS TO "NEWS."
