Heavy Bereavement.—In our death column will be found notices of the demise of four children of Brother James Harvey Mangum, of Nephi, Juab County. The Utah and Nevada Railway.—The articles of incorporation of the above-named railroad, were filed yesterday in the office of the auditor of public accounts. By this action, the Utah Western Railway Company becomes a thing of the past. It is the design to push the road, under its new name, from its present southern terminus, to Tanner's Springs, Juab County, a distance of about 87 miles. The directors of the road are E. F. Bishop and T. L. Watson, of Bridgeport, Ct.; R. M. Bassett, of Birmingham, Ala.; Cyrus W. Field, and Benjamin Richardson, of New York, and W. W. Ritter, of L. Williams, Le Grand Young, Abram Gould, James Sharp and Bolivar Roberts, of this city. The capital stock is \$2,000,000. The changes herein described are the results of the proceedings in foreclosure instituted against the Utah Western last summer, the effect of which was the selling of the road early in November. Mr. Ritter, who purchased it, acted as agent for Mr. Bassett, trustee for a number of the former bondholders, who have since formed the new company. The railroad, as its

The Home Murder Case.

This case was again resumed before Judge P. H. Emerson, in the Third District Court, this morning. Great interest is being manifested in the trial on the part of the public, the court room being filled with spectators.

The empanelling of the jury was immediately proceeded with.

Messrs. Van Zile and Beattie appeared on behalf of the people; Messrs. Sharp and Marshall on behalf of the defendant.

Ultimately, after a number of challenges on both sides, the empanelling of the jury was completed as follows:

The jury were then sworn, and a recess taken until two o'clock.

AFTERNOON SITTING.

On the re-assembling of the Court at this hour, the jury having answered to their names, the clerk of the Court read the indictment against Hopt, which appeared in our issue of last evening, to which the prisoner pleaded "not guilty."

Judge Van Zile then proceeded to state the case for the prosecution to the jury. The case, he said, they were called upon to try, of course they understood to be an important one, and at this time, at the outset of the trial, it seemed to him necessary that somewhat of a full statement should be made to them of what the prosecution expected to prove, and that they might see the application of the proofs. The Judge then proceeded to call the attention of the jury to the statute which applied to the case, and said that under that statute they expected to bring forth evidence which they should find would prove conclusively that the defendant was guilty of this charge. Mr. Van Zile then related at length the circumstances of the murder, and laid down the theory of the prosecution as to how the murder was committed.

Testimony was then called. John W. Turner was the first witness, who in answer to questions put by Mr. Van Zile said: "I reside in Provo City. I did not hear the statement you made to the jury. I can give you a general description of this young man (the murdered son) in his life-time, just prior to the alleged killing. He was about five feet six and a half or seven inches in height. He was not quite as tall as myself. He was of rather dark complexion. Just before leaving for Park City he had his hair cut short. He was dressed in a pair of lightish pants, a check shirt, and a vest. He had on a pair of shoes. He had on a broad-rimmed summer hat. He had a silver ring on his left finger, that he had worn for three years. The ring was produced. He went away to do teaming in the mining camps. He took with him four horses and two wagons. He left home on the afternoon of the 28th of June. With me he descended in detail the wagons, color of the horses, etc., and then continued: After I heard the report that my son's body had been found, I started for Echo, on the evening of the 10th of July. I arrived at Piedmont a little after daylight. I began my search. About noon of that day I went down to where some men were hauling timber, to see if I could identify the wagon which had arrived there. It was the wagon which belonged to my son. I also found the son's body. I also found a bell which my son had used on his horses. This is about all I found at that time. I then went on further east, went to Green River that evening, where I found the new wagon. It was the new wagon belonging to the deceased. I knew the wagon in various ways. My name was on it; I also knew it by the tongue. I found on that wagon the marking of my own name. I also found, on a pillow, a couple of quilts and a pillow. I did not find any grain sacks there. These were sent me from Evanston with my brand on. At Green River I did not see the other team on that trip. The quilts and pillow I identified as belonging to my son. I believe it to be the pillow. The pillow case had been taken off. It was very bloody. I went on from there. I know the defendant. I have known him over a year. I have had him in my charge. He lived about my place. He worked for me. Case proceeding as we go to press.

The New Liquor Ordinance.

Elsewhere will be found the full text of "An Ordinance Licensing and Regulating the Sale of Spirituous and Fermented Liquors," passed by the City Council at its regular session last evening. It differs from the old law in several particulars. Applications for license to sell liquors must thereafter be made to the City Council instead of to the Mayor, as hitherto, and the Council may grant the license if they are satisfied that the applicant will keep an orderly and respectable house. Licenses will state whether liquor is to be sold by wholesale, retail or by the drink. Liquor must not be sold to persons intoxicated. Restaurant keepers or proprietors of any houses, other than regularly licensed saloons, must neither sell nor give away liquor on their premises. No persons but the regular employees of a saloon will be allowed, by law, to remain at said saloon during prescribed hours. Persons refusing to leave saloons at hours of closing, are to be ejected by the proprietor, who may call to his aid the police, if necessary. No other kind of business will be permitted to be carried on, hereafter, in connection with liquor saloons. See the ordinance.
