The Republic Intends Sending One or More Attacks to the French Legation.

## THE POPE AT A RECEPTION GIVEN TO THE CARDINALS.

## A PRACTICAL STEP.

Please Will Appoint Commercial Agents in Various Countries.

PARIS, April 7.—The French government has decided to appoint at all its consulates commercial agents, in addition to their regular officers who will be known as commercial attachés. It will be their duty to study the manners and customs of the countries with which they deal, so that they will be expected at all times to ready to make any investigations or answer any questions concerning the commercial interests of France. The result of this will be that the country will be better informed of what is going on. It is expected that this step, which has long been desired by merchants, will eventually lead to a more rapid and extensive trade and extra facilities for export and extend the import trade of this country.

He Hopes the Irish Will Maintain Confidence in themselves.
