

# ANTI TRUST LAW ENFORCEMENT

To Bring it About "Just Put Those Malefactors of Great Wealth In the Penitentiary."

## IS SENATOR BAILEY'S REMEDY

Expects to See United States Steel Corporation Officers Imprisoned or Become Fugitives from Justice.

Washington, May 13.—"Just put some of those malefactors of great wealth in the penitentiary and you will see the anti-trust law enforced without any further violations," said Senator Bailey of Texas, during his tariff speech in the senate today.

He referred to the United States Steel corporation, charging it with violating the anti-trust laws. He insisted that if the authorities use the right methods the corporation will be dissolved, adding that if the present administration fails in its duty the people would choose other officials to represent them.

"Send one of those men who may be found violating the interstate commerce law or the anti-trust law to the penitentiary," he added, "and you will stop these violations by others. You cannot do it with fines, because when the court fines a trust, the trust fines the people, and as long as the punishment is measured in dollars and cents they will continue to violate the law. Men take the chance of pecuniary loss in the hope of realizing a greater pecuniary gain. Send one of them to the penitentiary and it will work like magic."

"The millionaire," continued Mr. Bailey, who was receiving the rapt attention of senators on both sides of the chamber, "values one thing more than his fortune, and that is his liberty. He does not love justice. He does not love that peace of mind for which others struggle. But he loves his liberty."

"I expect to see the United States Steel corporation officers imprisoned or become fugitives from justice, and if men now charged with the administration of the law fail to perform their duty, I have an abiding faith that the American people will call into their service another set of men, if not from another party, at least another set of men from your party. The stalwarts of today would become the insurgents of that day, and the insurgents of this generation would be the stalwarts of the next generation. That is as certain as any event in the future can be."

## LIVED ON CHARITY. DIED WORTH THOUSANDS

New York, May 14.—Searchers in the home of Mrs. Mary Cleary, 90 years old, who died yesterday after living for many years on the charity of her neighbors, found bankbooks, scattered about her Brooklyn home, representing bank deposits of \$12,800. For 25 years Mrs. Cleary's only companions in her little hovel were four cats. When well enough she solicited aid from residents of the neighborhood, who were almost as poor as she was supposed to be, and when she was ill they brought food to her.

## RELIGIOUS THERAPEUTICS STRONGLY DENOUNCED

Chicago, May 14.—A fresh lot of denunciations against religious therapeutics and other forms of healing formed part of an address by Dr. Alonzo C. Tenney, before the Illinois Homeopathic Medical association.

Dr. Tenney declared that "lay brethren who complain of an accession of new (old) ideas are suffering with vestigial brain storms; that certain ideas advanced by the psychotherapists spring from a past as dim as their logic."

"He who wanders in the paths of modern mysticism is smoking intellectual poppy," said Dr. Tenney. "Why should we physicians permit ourselves to be utilized as diagnostic tools? Why should we permit the diagnosed case to be treated by an ecclesiastical psychotherapist? By what right does he assume superior wisdom in ministering to a mind diseased?"

"Is there a special skill acquired by delivering weekly sermons or in creating a woman's sewing circle, or by keeping the choir from breaking up because of petty jealousies or by organizing a mother's club or by leading the weekly prayer meeting?"

"The church has for many decades performed a most excellent duty in the inculcation of high morals. For nearly eight centuries religion and the practice of medicine have been separate. The present strenuous life detracts from the influence of the church. The catchwords, 'be a live wire,' 'deliver the goods,' 'get busy,' 'keep smiling' and 'do it now,' when contrasted with the rapid vaporings of the average psychotherapist is a sweetly babbling brook."

## STRANGE DISEASE DESTROYING FORESTS

New York, May 14.—A strange disease has broken out among the trees of the east. Whole forests have been devastated. More than 20,000 trees in Forest park, Brooklyn, alone, have been destroyed since the opening of spring, by a peculiar parasite. Of these 15,000 were chestnut trees.

The Brooklyn park commission is using thousands of gallons of a germicide in the hope of preventing the spread of the disease.

The attention of the department of agriculture at Washington was called to this parasite last year, when it had gained only a slight foothold in this country. The department assigned a number of experts to the matter and they discovered that the parasite had been imported, probably from France, and that in the young trees and shrubs it had been disseminated throughout a large portion of the United States.

Many thousands of dollars were spent by the department in cautioning foresters, farmers and others throughout the east, the middle west, and the south, and in advising remedies to be employed. So far, New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania have been the principal sufferers, but reports from Indiana, Ohio and Illinois and the trans-Mississippi and the southeastern states indicate that the plague is in its incipency there and that heroic measures must be employed to save the trees from this pest.

# WRIGHTS, WHO RETURN IN TRIUMPH; THEIR SISTER AND MEDAL FROM AERO CLUB



The Wright brothers, Wilbur and Orville, and their sister, Miss Katherine, received a great ovation on their return from Europe, where the triumphs of the Dayton (O.) inventors, with their wonderful aeroplane, not only linked their names with those of kings, but excited the interest of the greatest scientists of the old world. The Wrights are still as modest and as silent about their invention as they were when they went abroad, although they return with half a million dollars' profit and contracts with foreign governments that will net them many hundreds of thousands more. The reticence on the part of the Wrights was the subject of comment in all the European capitals that they visited, but the reason is not far to seek. When a deputation of French experts visited them at Dayton a few years ago nothing had been published concerning the actual construction of their aeroplane. Their patents were not then fully perfected, and up to that time they had maintained all possible secrecy through fear of imitation and infringement. Before the Frenchmen had returned to Paris full diagrams of the machine had been published broadcast in Europe, and many imitators were busily engaged in constructing aeroplanes. Thereafter the Wrights steadily declined to be interviewed. Now they hint that they have some surprises in store when they again demonstrate the workings of their machine at Fort Meyer, Va. They will be in Washington on May 15, and President Taft will present to them a medal, the gift of the Aero club of America. On June 17 they will visit Dayton, where a three days' celebration is being arranged in their honor. When Orville Wright went abroad after his accident at Fort Meyer, in which Lieutenant Selridge was killed, he was accompanied by Miss Katherine Wright, their sister, whose savings as a schoolteacher aided them in perfecting their invention. She shared all their honors abroad, meeting the king of Spain, King Edward, the king of Italy and thousands of other important personages.
