session this evening and transacted the following business: The committee on finance reported that it had estimated thatitwould take \$25,000 to conduct the city government during the year 1901. Of this amount \$18,000 had to be provided by direct taxation. To secure this amount there was \$1,900,00 valuation in the ity on which to levy. The following is the levy made:

For contingent expenses, 416 mills; for improvements and repair of streets, 14 mills: to pay interest on water works bonds and to provide for the re-demption of the same, 3½ mills. Of 1½ mills street tax one mill can be paid in labor and the balance in cash. The levy

for 1900 was 7½ mills. The city recorder presented his finanial statement for the quarter ending July 30th showing cash on hand, April 1st, \$21,427.07, the amount raised from licenses, fines, etc. was \$2,770.79. The disoursements amounted to \$7427.58, leav. ing a balance in the treasury of \$16,-770.28. There had been collected from

WEBER COUNTY BUSINESS.

The board of county commissioners met yesterday and transacted some business of importance.

Commissioner Smith, heretofore ap-1.-That all persons and common pointed to act with a like commis-sioner from Cache county relative to tax sale of certain lands, reported progress.

The following resolution was adopted unanimously:

carriers are hereby prohibited from bringing into or leaving within the limits of Weber county any indigent or insane persons or travelers, not residents of said county. 2.-That all persons or common car-

tiers bringing paupers, indigent or insane persons or travelers into Weber county, and leaving them within the limits of said county, shall be held responsible for whatever amount it may be necessary for Weber county to expend in furnishing support and transportation for said paupers, Indigent or insane persons or travelers.

3.-That the committee on poor be instructed to see that the above resolutions are enforced, and to report any infraction thereof.

4.—That all railroad companies doing business in Weber county be noti-fied of the adoption of the above rules and regulations under and in pursu-ance of sub-division 43 of section 511 of the revised statutes of 1898.

A communication was received from auditor informing the board that he had made all changes upon assess ment rolls as ordered by board of equalization and that after such equalization the total value of all property in Weber county, except railroads, telegraph and others assessed by State board, was \$9,729,435, of which \$7,032,-575 was valuation of property in the city and the balance, or \$2,687,860, was the county valuation.
