Standish. COUNTERFEIT COINS.

Boy Discovers a Package and Delivers * It to Sheriff Howells.

There has come into the possesion of Sheriff Howelis a number of counterfelt coins said to have been ploked up by a small boy, whose name the officers refuse to divulge, near the State prison. In the collection were fourteen silver dollars, three ten-dollars gold pleces, one five-dollar piece and four ten-dollar pieces, not quite finished, all counterfeits, and a die for the making of five-dollar pieces. When found they were wrapped in a piece of mattress cloth, which had been pushed into an old mustard can. The lad took them to the sheriff's office where they underwent a careful examination. The coins are exceptionally poor imitations, showing the colners to have been ama-teurs at the business. They would not deceive even a street-car conductor. who have more smooth quarters and dimes passed off on them than any oth-

er class of business or professional men. They all bear the date of 1899. men. The usual number of theories are be-ing advanced in regard to them. It thought by some of the officers that they were thrown away by the counter-

feiters, who feared arrest. Others think the makers became disgusted with their poor workmanship and purposely got rid of them, while others fancy they were lost. Investigations are now in progress,
