

William B. Lowry asked to be appointed to a position on the police force. Received and filed.

A large number of citizens asked that they be relieved from paying the excessive special sidewalk tax levied on their property, saying that they were assessed in some cases at least \$100 in advance of the actual cost of the construction of the sidewalks in front of their property. Laid on the table.

Houlahan & Griffith sent in a communication in which they stated that there are a number of property owners in the brick sidewalk district who had paid the assessment for a brick walk and after doing so had laid cement walks. Board of public works.

The Salt Lake Rapid Transit Street Railway Company asked to be allowed to lay a sidewalk on North Temple street, between Main street and the north central gate in the Temple Block. Committee on streets.

#### NORTH BENCH AND CAPITOL HILL.

The city engineer reported that he had completed the location of the pipe

line to carry water from City Creek to Capitol Hill and the North bench as high as Thirteenth street, and that it would be necessary to cross the lands of Adam C. and Ernest Spiers, for a distance of half a mile. Also that it would be necessary for the city to purchase one and a half acres of said lands on which to construct tanks, gate-houses, etc., for that system. Adopted.

#### LIQUOR ORDINANCE.

An ordinance relating to and providing for the sale of spirituous, vinous, malt and other intoxicating liquors, and to corking and bottling of such liquors, was read twice and laid over for one week.

The ordinance provides that a wholesale and retail liquor business can be conducted by procuring a retail license, provided that only one bar be run on the premises, and that the business is conducted on the same floor and under the same roof.

Section 2 provides that any person who engages in the business of bottling and corking liquors which are not prepared or manufactured in this city shall pay a license of \$150 per quarter.

#### THE SURVEYS DO NOT AGREE.

The city engineer reported that the work of resurveying plat E had progressed so far as to show that there was a difference between the lines of the original survey and the lines indicated by recent improvements. In order to rectify these differences he asked that a committee be appointed and authorized to take such steps as were necessary to complete the work, in a manner that would meet with the approval of the City Council. Committee on streets with the city attorney and city engineer associated.

#### SURVEYORS, TAKE NOTICE!

The same officer presented a communication in which he represented that he had established, by means of stone monuments, at Liberty Park, a standard to which all measuring instruments in his office were kept adjusted. He also asked that the standard of measure used by him be made official and that an ordinance be passed making it an offense punishable by a fine not exceeding \$250 to make surveys without first adjusting their instruments by the official standard. Adopted.

#### RESIGNATION ACCEPTED.

Allie Barker sent in his resignation as a police officer and asked that it take effect at once. Accepted.

#### HIS SUCCESSOR.

Mayor Scott reported the appointment of William E. Carey to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Barker. Confirmed.

#### IN EXCHANGE.

City Attorney Hall reported a form of deed between the city and L. C. Trent, to be used in the exchange of certain lands on north State street. Adopted.

#### HIS REQUEST GRANTED.

Regarding the petition of Albert Mayer, for a reduction in the assessed valuation of certain improvements on his land, made after January 1st of the present year, the city attorney recommended that inasmuch as the improvements were made since January 1, and the matter had been regularly brought to the attention of the Board of Equal-
