Conditions Prevailing in the East Has Had a Sympathetic Effect on Market.

OFFERINGS OF OHIO COPPER.

This Bingham Stock Sold as Low as \$5 a Share Today—Forenoon Quotations.

The unsatisfactory condition of the eastern markets has had its effect locally. There was a notable absence of buying orders today and little other than professional trading was indulged in during the early calls. The first sale of the day was Nevada Fairview, which was bought at 12 1/2 and 13. The Tinio stocks brought to the fore were: Uncle Sam Consolidated, Beck Tunnel, Crown Point, Sioux Consolidated, May Day, Little Chief and Yankee Consolidated. A small lot of Nevada Hills was brought out at \$6.

There were several offerings of Ohio Copper on the open board and the sale of 100 shares was reported at \$5, while the closing bid for it was \$4.90. The belief was expressed by brokers that unless the price of copper metal made a very rapid decline, better prices can be expected for this stock. Mr. Helzer, who is the controlling factor in Ohio, regards the Ohio one of the best of his recent acquisitions and is quoted as having made the statement that he looks upon it as being a better proposition than any of those turned over to the Unalutated Copper company at Butte several months ago. The only sales of unalutated stock during the forenoon call was Copper Glance at 16 1/2 cents and New Stockton at 40 cents.

COMMONWEALTH STRIKE.

High Grade Silver Ore Found in Lincoln County Mine.

Lincoln, Aug. 6.—What is pronounced the most sensational strike in Beaver county since horn silver was struck about ground on the property, which subsequently was given and still bears the name of the mine, was encountered in the main tunnel of the Commonwealth mine, 780 feet in, on Sunday. A porphyry dyke 27 feet thick had just been cut through and a shot was put in Saturday night, on being ignited Sunday it exposed four feet of ore which fairly scintillated with all the colors of a toy box of paint, only brighter and bespeaking greater consequence.

The best of it would require four figures to express its value and the average something which the mining fraternity unite in pronouncing great. The vein is ten feet wide and all exploitation shows ore in every direction. The property is situated in Lincoln district, adjacent to the Progressive, the Burning Moscow, the Hub, the Atlas and other well known producers.

It is stated, one of the mining men who needs no introduction to Lincoln readers, came down from Salt Lake at the end of the week and at once went with P. B. McKee to Roosevelt Hot Springs, going from there to Lincoln district, where he made a thorough inspection of properties of a mining nature. He returned today and will go to the Douglas Copper company's mine, where he will receive a check for his examination of the Cactus and September mine, then to Lincoln, where he will receive a check for his examination of the investments amounting to \$200,000 worth of stocks were made. He is looking for investments, not altogether as a commission, but in a personal way, and is preferred so far as he is concerned, and there are plenty of that kind here; also every other kind that anybody may want.

NEW MEXICAN SMELTER.

Plant Will Handle Custom Ores Under Government Charter.

One of the most complete smelters in all Mexico now is being constructed by the Douglas Copper company in Fundacion, in the state of Sonora. It will be ready for operation in September and because of its many new features, attracting wide attention among mining men.

The machinery throughout the plant, including the pumps, will be motor driven. An abundant supply of good water is at hand; the general conditions are reported to be ideal. The smelter will be of 600 tons capacity and the service will be by means of a 35-inch gauge railway, all material being moved by locomotives, including the slag and matte.

Although the plant will handle custom ores under its charter from the Mexican government, the property is owned by the Douglas Copper company, all of which are located in the district of Arizona, the best known group of mines being El Cobre. For four years the company has been developing that property. The work has been extended to a depth of one mile and to a length of half a mile along the vein. The presence of the company have estimated that there is enough ore to reserve on this one property to keep the plant in operation for five years.

STORY OF THE HARDIN MINE

Rich Silver Property Situated in The Black Rock Range in Nevada.

EXACT LOCATION UNKNOWN.

Efforts to Find Lost Mine in Late Years Have Thus Far Proved Unsuccessful.

Somewhere out on the Black Rock desert, not many miles from Rosobud, there is a mine of extreme richness, says the News of Rosobud, Nevada. It is one of the lost mines of the early history of Nevada. It is called the "Hardin Silver Mine" and its richness has often been told of by California emigrants who were with Hardin when he picked up the slab of white metal.

It was in the early part of the year 1850 that an emigrant crossed the Black Rock desert on its way to the then great gold fields of California. At a point near the extreme southern end of the Black Rock range, he was attracted by the gleam of white metal. He was coming down one of the mountains and in stepping from one ledge of rock to another his attention was attracted by the gleam of white metal. He stopped to investigate and picked up a large slab of almost solid mineral, resembling lead. Taking a piece with him to the place where the train was camped for the night he showed it to his comrades and they were all of the same opinion, that it was lead.

Little or nothing was known of silver ore at that time, so the piece of supposed lead was thrown into one of the wagons and forgotten. Several weeks afterward, as the emigrant train was traveling down the Pitt River valley, in California, the party was attacked by Indians and their ammunition having run short one of the emigrants happened to think of the mysterious metal which had been found on the desert by Hardin. It was melted into bullets which were used with good effect in skirmishes with the marauding redskins. As the story goes, a new row of the bullets were sent to the happy hunting grounds by well aimed missiles molded from what afterward proved to be pure silver.

Knowledge did not come until several years later, after the discovery of silver on the Comstock. Then members of the emigrant party party who had been with Hardin, and at their old camping ground found several pieces of the metal which they had cast into bullets before. It was tested and proved to be solid silver.

A company was organized at Petaluma, Cal., where Mr. Hardin was running a blacksmith shop and he with others, started for the mine. The discovery. Arriving at what Mr. Hardin thought was the place they commenced to prospect and spent considerable time in diligent search without success. The place where he had picked up the rich metal, though he claimed there was plenty of it scattered on the hillside. Unsuccessful in the search, the party was forced to abandon the treasure hunt and returned to California.

In later years Mr. Hardin made a number of trips into the Black Rock desert, but they were of little expedition, were all unsuccessful.

More recently rich silver float has been found near the place where Hardin was supposed to have picked up the metal, but the place where he had picked up the metal has always ended in failure.

The formation where the Hardin silver was found is very similar to that at Rosobud. The Brown Palace has ore of almost pure silver and there is good reason to believe that another rich mineral belt lies further out on the desert.

The Hardin emigrant party left the Humboldt river at a point near where Mill City now stands and passed through by Rabbit Hole Springs, where they were an old fort, for the protection of the emigrants passing through to California. This place was the last watering place before reaching the other side of the Black Rock desert. From the fort the train crossed the desert to Black Rock range of mountains and then northward to Soldiers' meadows. When Mr. Hardin brought in the rich silver ore, the Black Rock desert, there being a spring of water there.
