

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRE.—Only a moderately filled house was in attendance last evening; the plays presented were "The Honey Moon" and the "Maniac Lover," they were very well performed.

To-night "Macbeth" will be produced with all of Lock's original music, in which a full chorus will appear. The principal solos will be sung by Mrs. Carless and Mr. J. M. Hardy. This piece has always been a favorite and we hope a full house will reward the efforts of the management to please and gratify the public mind.

LECTURE TO-NIGHT.—The well-known "Red Bunting" will deliver a lecture this evening at the 13th Ward Assembly Rooms. The subject he has chosen is "The Industrial and Social Importance of Total Abstinence from the use of Intoxicating Drinks," as exemplified in the people here, contrasted with those met elsewhere. The lecture commences at a quarter past eight.

THAT BANNER.—Messrs. Tresscott and Jones, representatives of the "Mechanics' Union," called upon us with the design for a fine banner, six by eight feet, illustrating various branches of home manufacture compared with the imported articles, to be used in the procession on the occasion of the forthcoming celebration. It will be painted by Mr. D. J. Regan of this city, and will be a beautiful specimen of what our home artists can do.

SAFE IN ENGLAND.—We have received information of the safe arrival at Liverpool of the steamship City of Antwerp, having on board Elders Tuddenham, Toome, Romney, Park and a number of other missionaries, after an exceedingly pleasant passage, her passengers from Salt Lake City reaching the shores of Old England in less than three weeks after their departure from the valleys of Utah. Some foolish persons, here, some time since, succeeded in circulating a report that the vessel had been lost on her passage, causing much anxiety in the families of the elders who sailed on her; the notice of her safe arrival will be consolatory to those who were the recipients of such reports, and the disseminating of such reports is highly reprehensible and should meet with an earnest rebuke from every right-minded citizen.

CASTELLO'S CIRCUS.—The circus was again attended last evening by an immense throng of people and everything was done in the same satisfactory manner as on the previous occasions. The audience was kept in excellent humor all through the performance, and heartily enjoyed every scene. There were no balks or failures; but everything that was attempted was done well; all the animals are excellently trained and the performers are first-class in their line. Mr. Dan Castello as the clown was highly appreciated, and his performances with his trained Russian steed, "Car," his immense horse "Johnny" and the intelligent mules, which are so cute in discriminating between good, obedient, truth-telling, Sunday school boys and those who are not of his class, we have never seen excelled. His "whoo, January" was exceedingly funny, and kept the audience in a roar. In riding, also, we should imagine that he would be hard to beat; his and the other performers' leaps from the spring board, over the backs of eight horses and turning somersaults as they descended, being really very fine. The Brazilian family of Alexandria Lowanda are first-class artists in their line. Martin's riding and feats on his trained horse excited the body's wonder and admiration. Probably no audience of the same number can be found on the continent so critical and appreciative in matters of riding as those which have visited the circus since its arrival in this Territory; for our people, especially the young men, brought up in this country, are first-class horsemen. Signorita Clarinda and young Arabalaco Lowanda elicited rounds of applause. The wonderful balancing powers of Professor Sparks, and his remarkable feats of strength, were not the least attractive portion of the performance. The cannon, which was used were no hollow spheres, but the genuine, solid article, though the case with which he played with them and caught them would lead one to suppose that they were glass balls. The exhibition by the Tamer of his performing lions in their den, and the growling and snarling of the beasts, was rather startling to the timid portion of the audience; but he is their master, and they evidently feel it, though we noticed that he was careful to keep his eye on them, and not turn his back to them. Taken altogether we think our people cannot fail to be gratified by the performance.

This afternoon a matinee was given, and to-night they again appear introducing a variety of new acts.
