Havana, Oct. 9 .-- Charles E. Magoon, the newly appointed provisional governor of Cuba, arrived here this afternoon. Coincident with his coming, Gov. Taft gave out a general decree proclaiming amnesty not only to the rebels, but to all persons charged with political offenses or crimes in any way connected with the revolution. He also issued orders ordering the attitude of the American marines and soldiers toward the people of Cuba.

Gov. Magoon declined to discuss his plans for the future. He said he had expected upon arriving at Washington to have 30 days' leave of absence prior to his departure for the Philippines. He did not regret, however, the change in program, and he expressed himself as gratified with being in Cuba. He said he would take up his residence with Minister Morgan as the minister's guest pending the departure of Gov. Taft and that he might continue to re-side there if he found it convenient. William H. Taft, as provisional gov-ernor of Cuba and secretary of war of the United States, tonight issued an the United States, tonight issued an order to Gen. Frederick Funston out-lining the duties of the American forces

in Cuba. in Cuba. The officers of marines stationed at various localities are advised that they are not expected to take part in any active way in the suppression of dis-order unless extreme emergency arises in which it is absolutely necessary for them to protect life and property. The In which it is absolutely necessary for them to protect life and property. The duties of the marines are generally limited to tendering their good offices between the conflicting elements and the prevention of that disorder of the the prevention of that disorder of the region which, in the state of tension be-tween the political parties is inevita-ble during the present crisis. It is also expected that the officers and men, both of the army and the ma-rine corps will exert every effort to show all the courtesy possible to Cu-bans of all partles and avoid in any way injuring their sensibilities." Prosecutors are ordered to have the proclamation applied to cases in which judgment has been already rendered, and further to those in which schtence is being served. After declar-ing that the procedure set forth in the last preceding clauses is to be followed in the prosecutions now pending on ac-count of the assaults on the rural guardsmen at Guanabacoa and in the villuendos case, full and complete par-Villuendos case, full and complete parden being granted to all offenders each of these cases. den
