The Percival contract has been held up because of his failure to complete his contract of last year. He appeared before the committees yesterday and agreed to complete his old contract and hence the committees decided to accept his bid for this year. The city will save about \$5,000 by Percival completing his former contracts as his bid last year was much lower than this year on account of the pipes being so much sheaper. The report of the committees will be sent to the council Monday night.

Interesting Lecture—One of the most interesting stereopticon lectures delivered in this city, was given last night, at the First Presbyterian church by Rev. Dr. F. E. Hodkin who has done missionary work in Asia Minor for many years. The subject of the lecture was the remarkable archaeological discoveries recently made east of the Jordan in the land of Edom, and particularly the city of Petrea whose ruins are among the most remarkable of the world. The doctor made two trips into that country, in 1901 and 1307, securing excellent photographs of the ruins of the Greek and Roman civilization of 2,000 years ago. The carvings of tombs and temples in the solid rock were a revelation, and the discovery of an ancient map upset many of the calculations of the Catholic church as to the sites of certain noted structures of the of certain noted structures of the apostolic age.
