## LOCAL BRIEFS.

The level of the great lake has risen two inches in the last two weeks.

Rabbi Freund speaks this evening in Unity hall, on "The Jew in Russia."

The Orpheus club has voted to participate in the "See America First" conference concert to be given in the Tabernacle.

Every mail brings assurance of support from prominent people over the United States of the "See America First" movement.

The Y. M. C. A. Juniors will present "The Old Dairy Homestead" this evening and tomorrow evening, in the association auditorium.

The department payrolls of the city for the first half of January, amounting to \$14,445, were paid yesterday by City Treasurer Swenson.

The hide and head of one of the buffaloes recently shot on Antelope island, will be mounted, and the price that will be asked for it is \$1,250.

The burial of the suicide James P. Watson will be here, in accordance with telegraphic instructions last evening from his father in San Francisco.

State Supt. of Schools Nelson will go to Provo this evening to deliver an address at the eighth annual convocation exercises of the school district.

Work has begun on the enlargement of the Metropolitan block annex on west Third South Street. The building will be completed by about the middle of May.

Ex-Ass't City Engineer L. F. Zolich, who left the city's employ in consequence of the change in administration, is now with the American Smelting and Refining company.

A local capitalist and honey grower is proposing to prepare a \$10,000 exhibit for the Interstate fair of 1907, consisting of a model of the Salt Lake Temple in comb, wax and strained honey.

Clerk Judd of the city board of education, has received a warrant from State Auditor Edwards for the sum of \$61,623.38, being the city's portion of the first appropriation of state district school funds for this year.

Secretary Raybould of the Elks has been assured of a carload of the noble herd from Provo, in attendance on the trek to Los Angeles next month. Manufacturers are sending in samples of badges for use on the excursion.

Gov. Cutler and Secretary of State Finney are considering the application for Indian war veteran medals and will have their work concluded within about two weeks, when the medals will be distributed to those entitled to them.

Today the first meeting of the Grand Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star convened in the Masonic hall in this city. The grand chapter was organized last September. The session will conclude with a banquet on Friday night.

H. Roe who defeated C. P. Overfield Tuesday in the election of Y. M. C. A. directors, has resigned in order that Mr. Overfield may have the position. Mr. Overfield is the personal representative of Mr. George Foster Teabody.

The Canadian association held a well attended meeting last evening, in Harmonie hall, where refreshments were served and addresses made. Resolutions of sympathy for the president, Mr. H. C. Tyrell, in the loss of his wife, were passed.

The annual meeting of the Salt Lake County Horticultural society will be held next Saturday, Jan. 20, at 1 p. m. in the city and county building, third floor. Officers for the ensuing year will be elected, and several other matters of importance will be attended to.

The First Regiment band will give a social hop next Friday night, in Armory hall, in aid of the band fund. All members of the national guard in uniform and their ladies will be admitted free. The members of the band furnish a fine orchestra from among their own number.

The meeting of the Council of Women which was to have been held yesterday afternoon, was postponed until next Wednesday at 3 p. m. A letter was read from the National American Woman Suffrage association, inviting delegates from this city to the Baltimore convention of Feb. 7-13.

W. C. Jensen, charged with embezzling \$600 from the safe at McCoy's livery stables, the money being election bets, and given to Jensen by Dr. J. S. Kendall for safe keeping, was held to answer to the district court by Justice Dana T. Smith yesterday afternoon. Jensen furnished bonds in the sum of \$1,000.

A San Francisco dispatch states that Landlord G. S. Holmes of the Knutsford, and Frank Knox, president of the National Bank of the Republic of this city, are now in San Francisco, and that Mr. Holmes is seeking to secure the management of the new \$2,000,000 Fairmont hotel recently erected by the Fair estate.

Editor H. J. Robinson of the Bingham Bulletin has filed charges at Washington against Postmaster C. H. Roberts, alleging that he is an unfit person to hold the office on the ground that he is interested in gambling houses at Bingham. The postmaster says he owns property whose tenants are gamblers, but he is not interested in the games himself.

## SHOT HIMSELF IN THE HEAD.

Leonard Smith, a Carpenter from Helper, Found Dead in His Room.

NO KNOWN MOTIVE FOR DEED.

Man Attempted Suicide a Month Ago But Timely Arrival of Medical Assistance Saved Him.

At 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon another case of suicide was brought to light when the body of Leonard Smith, a carpenter from Helper, was found in his room, 55 East Second South. The proprietor of the place, E. J. Steward, tried to get into the room and when he looked over the transom he saw Smith's body in a pool of blood on the floor. The man had shot himself through the head with a .38-caliber Smith and Wesson revolver.

The bullet penetrated Smith's head an inch and a half back of the right ear and at the base of the brain. Death was undoubtedly instantaneous. His hair and head were powder burned, showing that the gun had been held close to his head.

At what hour Smith committed the rash act is not known for a certainty. The shot was not heard by the roomers, although Steward said he thinks he heard Smith's body fall but thought some one had fallen out of bed, and paid no particular attention to it.

When the body was found yesterday afternoon, the police were at once notified and Sergeant Robert and Officer Heath hastened to the scene. Justice Deane T. Smith was notified and had the body removed to Evan's undertaking parlors. The officers were unable to discover any motive for the deed.

It was learned last night that Smith attempted suicide at Provo about a month ago, but the timely arrival of medical assistance saved him. He was the son of Peter A. Smith who came here from Helper. Mrs. George R. Stoll of Helper is a sister of Leonard Smith. Arrangements for the funeral have not been completed.

**EARLY SETTLER DEAD**

Mrs. Jane Stokes Passes Away at the Ripe Age of 85 Years.

Mrs. Jane Stokes, a well known resident of this city, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. M. A. Rich, 710 south Third West street, Tuesday evening, of general debility, aged 85 years and six months. The deceased was born in Charlemont, Dorsetshire, England, Aug. 15, 1820; was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, June 8, 1850, and came to Salt Lake City, Sept. 15, stopping at St. Louis, where she resided for four years. Her husband, Robert Stokes, who died in 1888, the following year Mrs. Stokes came to Utah with four children, crossing the plains in Edward Stevenson's company of ox teams. She arrived at Salt Lake City, Sept. 15, 1850. In March, 1850, she settled in the third ward, where she has resided ever since. Mrs. Stokes was a faithful and energetic worker in the Church ever since she joined it, and at the time of her death was the oldest person in the ward. She is survived by her daughter, two sons, R. P. Stokes of Preston, Ida., and S. J. Gilman of Summerville, Ore., and a large number of grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

The funeral will be held at 12 o'clock Sunday from the Fifth ward meeting-house. The remains may be viewed at the residence of her daughter from 10:30 a. m. Sunday.

- JAN. 18th
- 1782—Daniel Webster born at Salisbury, N. H.; died 1852.
  - 1818—Richard Yates, war governor of Illinois and 15th United States senator, born in Warsaw, Ky.; died 1853. Gov. Yates was first organizer of Union war power in the west. He promptly took military possession of Cairo and sent troops into Kentucky. In his office Grant received his first recognition as a soldier in the Civil war. Yates appointed him military officer and afterward colonel of the Twenty-first Illinois volunteers.
  - 1871—King William of Prussia, crowned emperor of Germany at Versailles.
  - 1885—Lina di Murska, opera singer of note in America and Europe, died in Munich; born 1826.
  - 1898—Ella Bassett Washington, great-granddaughter of George Washington, died in New York City.
  - 1903—Strike of the cotton mill operators at Fall River, Mass., which began July 25, 1904, settled through the mediation of Gov. Douglas.
