This morning the Fire Brigade lost a couple of pieces of heavy rope when on the way to the Main Street fire. The finder will oblige by leaving them at the Hall.

The electric light winked a little too much at the Fair last night. Occasional flashes of darkness was the consequence. The light has a most brilliant and beautiful effect in the building and on the grounds, nevertheless.

It is altogether too early to begin to talk of a coal scarcity, but such, however, is the fact. The demand is somewhat ahead of the supply, and the wintry winds have not yet come. Bring on the carbonaceous commodity.

Big Smoke.—At 11 o'clock to-day an alarm reached Firemen's Hall that a fire had broken out somewhere in Sugar House Ward. A dense cloud of smoke arising from that locality appeared to confirm the report. A visit to the spot developed the fact that the blaze was confined to the wheat stable on Bishop & A. Woolley's farm. The firemen turned out with their engines, but their services were not needed.

Should Have Stopped at Home.—J. Morrell, from the north country, came down to the capital a few days ago, was foolish enough to indulge his bibulous propensity, and landed in the city prison. He was released and now he is charged with stealing \$17 from a Montana miner, named Welch. The lad disappeared from the pack of the complainant while he was in Morrell's company, but that is not positive proof that he took it. The case was set for four o'clock, to be heard by Justice Pyper.

False Report.—A report that Apostle C.C. Rich died at two o'clock this morning, was widely circulated in this city, to-day. Numerous inquiries were made for confirmation of the rumor, which we are happy to state, was unfounded. We understand that the report was extensively floated in the northern part of the Territory, especially in Ogden, from which town a telegram was received here requesting details.

This forenoon, by direction of President John Taylor, a telegram was sent to Paris, Bear Lake Valley, inquiring about the state of Brother Rich's health, to which a cheering reply was obtained to the effect that he was feeling better. This latest news will be a great relief to those whose minds were on the stretch of suspense in consequence of the gloomy rumor that is now dispelled.

Fire on Main Street.—The fire alarm sounded at five minutes past 1 o'clock this morning, and within five minutes subsequently the fire brigade had two streams of water playing upon flames that had broken out in Col. J. R. Winder's building, next door north from the Cliff House.

The fire broke out among some Excelsior shavings in Martin's upholstery shop, and communicated to the upper part of the building, by the stairway, catching the part occupied by Stevens and Bartlett.

While the fire was in progress a middle wall fell over, several firemen narrowly escaping being buried in the debris. The flames were ultimately subdued by the vigorous and well-directed efforts of the Fire Brigade.

We are unable to give more than an approximate estimate of the damage, which is probably about as follows:

J. R. Winder, on building, \$2,700; Stevens & Bartlett, \$500; Martin, \$500; Heworth, butcher, was damaged to some extent by the water from the hose, and the Cliff House was slightly damaged from the outside by injury to one or two of the windows.
