At present there is \$4,000 in cash in the treasury and the company is indebted to the extent of \$100.

GIVE REPORT SOON

Statement Will Disclose Some Interesting Facts on Company Earnings.

COPPER IS MUCH HIGHER.

Company Has Enormous Deposits of Lead Which Can be Taken Out At Any Time.

The annual report of the Utah Conmiduted Mining company which is to e issued within a few days, will contuln some interesting figures on the earning capacity of the company. It r expected to show exchings target than the \$2 per share paid in dividend in 1995, although the surplus is not expected to be as large. The company poid dividends of \$7 per share in 1907 85 in 1906, \$4.50 in 1095, and \$3 a shirfor the years 1804 and 1903. Thus the in the year 1900 one quarterly dividend 6 cents has been paid.

The company has a contract with the American Smelting & Refining c. m. pany for the smelting of ore which has about a year more to run. After the contract expires the company will send its product to the new smelter in Pine canyon which is being built by the Cole-Ryan crowd. Work on this smelter is being rushed in record style and General Manager E. P. Mathewson declares that it is an absolute certainty that the plant will be compisted to begin business by the first of next year. In the circular issued to the stockin deers by the president of the Utah Consolidated some time ago it was stated that the savings in smelter charges under the 10-year contract with the International Smelting commany, would be equal to \$1 a share on the stock.

Conditions at the Pine canyon smelter are now assuming larger proportions. As soon as the new road is finished from Topele, which is expected by the last of the month of April, if the weather continues fair, the real work of building the \$2,000,000 plant will begin in earnest.

It is reported that the question of building a tunnel from the mines to Pine canyon, is under discussion, and that this tunnel may be run through Utah Consolidated and Utah Apex properties to a connection with the Mascotte tunnel. This would be more expensive from the standpoint of the initial expense, but owing to the mountains to be crossed the expense of operation afterward would be much less as compared with a tramway.

It is known that the company has opened up some rich ore bodies in the property to the northwest, and it is stated by well informed men that the mine is looking as well today as at any time in its history, also that while some of the new ore bodies are not as rich in gold that the percentage of copper much higher. It is a fact also that only a small fraction of the company's property has been developed.

A fact which is not generally known is that the Utah Consolidated has enermous deposits of lead which can be taken out at any time, and it is a question whether the Cole-Ryan interests will no undertake the smelting of lead ores at the Pine Canyon smelter as well as copper. This may be a basis for some sort of an arrangement between the new smelting interests and the Guggenheims, as the latter have made their great successes in lead smelting, and the Cole-Ryan interests are primarily conserned with the red metal, so that the contract for treating the Utah Consolidated ores may be even a larger factor in the smelting situation.
