days to come.

President George Q Cannon said one of the most important lessons we have to learn is to have perfect o offdence lu our God and he obedieut under all circumstances; if we are patient God will overrule that which seems adverse so that it will become favorable to us; Jesus went through trisis and difficulties to quality Him for the high and exalted position He occupier; we should constantly seek to have the veil of darkness rent from before "you have heard much of the tuffu ence of the Priesthoud-the day will come when the Priesthood will be sought for, and the counsel and wie dom of these men will he sought for, and as calamities increase the eyes of the world will be turned towards the servants of God;" notwithstanding certain divisions among this people. God has not deserted them and those who go through these things will be rewarded; remember that Batan is trying to get a harvest of souls for now is a good time.

Sunday night an evening meeting was held and President George Q. Cannou and Elder Brigham Youn. spake to a large and attentive audience for nearly two hours. It is seldom the people of Box Elder are favored with the presence of so many of our Church leaders and at this time the people tell they had been succially favore !.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS.

ST. Louis, Oct. 31.-At 5:22 a. m. several earthquake shocks were dis-tluctly felt here. The vibrations were from east to west, and each shock continued several seconds. The operators Western Uupion Telegraph office bacame alarmed and several rushed from the hullding. The shocks were not accompanied by any rumbling noise. Clocks were stopped and windows rattled but no serious damage has as yet been reported.

CAIRO, Ill., Oct. 31 .- An earthquake at 5:09 a. m. was the severest ever felt in this section. It lasted 30 seconds. The vibrations were upth and south. The people left their nouses for existy, Many, chimneys were shaken down. The public library building was badly damaged.

ZANESVILLE, Ohio, Oct. 81 .- A few minutes after 5 c'clock this morning the residents lu all parts of the city were aroused by a distinct earthquake shock. It caused the residence to tremble violently, in some cases loosening the pictures from the walls, caustog stovepipes and tin ware to fall from their fastenings. The trembling con-tinued half a minute. It was the most severe earthquake ever felt iu this

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Oct. 31.-Two severe and disti of earthquake shocks were felt throughout northern Ohio shortly after 5 o'clock this morning, the occupants were much alarmed, Each shock lasted nearly a minute, accompanied by heavy rumbling.

NILES, Mich., Oct. 81 .- An earthquase was felt uere at 5:15 this morniug, lasting five minutes. Buildings trembled, wholows cracked, heds swayed, and people rushed out of hors alarmed to the highest pitch. Pictures fell to the floor. Three disilnet shocks Were felt.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 31.-At 5:18 this morning two very distinct earthquake shocks were fell, the oscillation lasting fully two minutes. Houses trembled, windows rattled and chairs rocked, causing considerable alarm,

ATLANTA, Oct. 81 .- An earthquake shock was seit here distinctly at 5:10 this morning.

curred here at 5:08 a.m. After the first shock the earth's surface con-tinued to vibrate fully twenty minutes, Hundreds of chimneys toppled down. The plate glass in several store fronts was broken to bite. The brick Method-ist courch was badly shattered and the plastering knocked from a hundred or more interiore.

In the country, four miles south, the crust of the earth was broken in fity places and from the fissures water is gushing in considerable Volumes. same phenomena are reported in the district still jurther south and also at Big Lake, several miles north of town. Rome, Nov. 1,-A severe and pro-longed earthquake snock was felt here at 4:88 this morning. Many houses swayed hadly, Walls were oracked and ploutres fell from the walle. people ran panic stricken into the streets and serious disaster was apprehended. Happily the first shock seems to have ended the subterraneous disturhance, without serious damage. Some idea of the alarm created may be gathered from the fact that prison of Regina Colli was so badly shaken that the terrified prisoners broken into open revolt and tried to escape. Trops from a neighboring harracks were summoned and the prisoners wore driven back at the point of the hayonet. The Vatioan buildings were severely shaken, but the pope was perfectly traugutl. He sent to the nearest lice depot to inquiry if there had been any loss of life or any serious damage

The series of shocks lasted 11 seconds. Two clocks in the observatory were stopped and the old tower of the onds. Roman cullege was cracked. nouses collapsed and it is reported several persons were injured. Four palaces and the Bank of Italy are uninhabitable. Palazzo Odescaichi and five other palaces are seriously fujured. The Vatican buildings, quirinal rail-ruad station and ministerial offices are also reported to have sustained some damage.

The latest advices from Rome say that no serious damage was done, Beveral houses were slightly cracked, Chimneys fell, and the walls of the parracks of the Swiss Guards at the Vatican were slightly cracked.
