

BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

New York, 3.—The jury on the inquest regarding the death of the Spanish Minister, Barco, rendered a verdict of death while temporarily insane.

The steamship Adriatic arrived to day from Liverpool. Among her passengers are John and William from England and the Continent, guests of Rufus Hatch, during the excursion to the Yellowstone Park.

New York, 3.—The first late of hops of the season arrived this morning being four days earlier than the late last year, and was sold in a prominent brewing firm for 30 cents a pound. It was grown in Oasida county, N. Y.

Philadelphia, 3.—A memorial celebration of the 22d anniversary of the birth of the late Uria L. Stephens, founder of the Order of Knights of Labor, is being held at Rensselaer Assembly No. 1, of this city. Attendance by T. N. Reynolds, Mayor of Scranton, who succeeded Stephens as Grand Master Workman of the Order, will deliver the address.

Chicago, 3.—A finely educated young Swede was found lying dead in the Swedish Lutheran Church, in Englewood near this city yesterday, having committed suicide. The morning papers claim the young man has been identified as the illegitimate son of King Oscar of Sweden, and that he was raised in the family of a sister of the King. During his stay in this country, he has been engaged as instructor in a private school.

Chicago, 3.—On the fourth day's session of the German American Teachers' Association a resolution passed pledging support to a German American school at Milwaukee. Debate was then resumed on Mr. Schurik's paper on ethical culture in schools, and after an extended discussion the matter was referred to the committee to report at the next annual convention.

The committee on physical culture recommended the introduction of gymnastic exercises, especially calisthenics, and the German introduction of taking pupils out for whole days' tramping through the woods and fields, with lessons drawn from nature as observed.

Mr. Grahnstrom read a paper giving points in favor of the general introduction of German teaching in public schools.

Mr. Hasterman of Cincinnati presented the report of the committee on statistics, showing that in this country German is taught in 839 cities and towns, to 208,000 pupils by 4,500 teachers in the public schools, an increase during the year of 14,200 pupils, and 200 teachers.

New York, 3.—A number of striking cigar makers returned to work to-day, the difficulties between them and the employers having been temporarily settled.

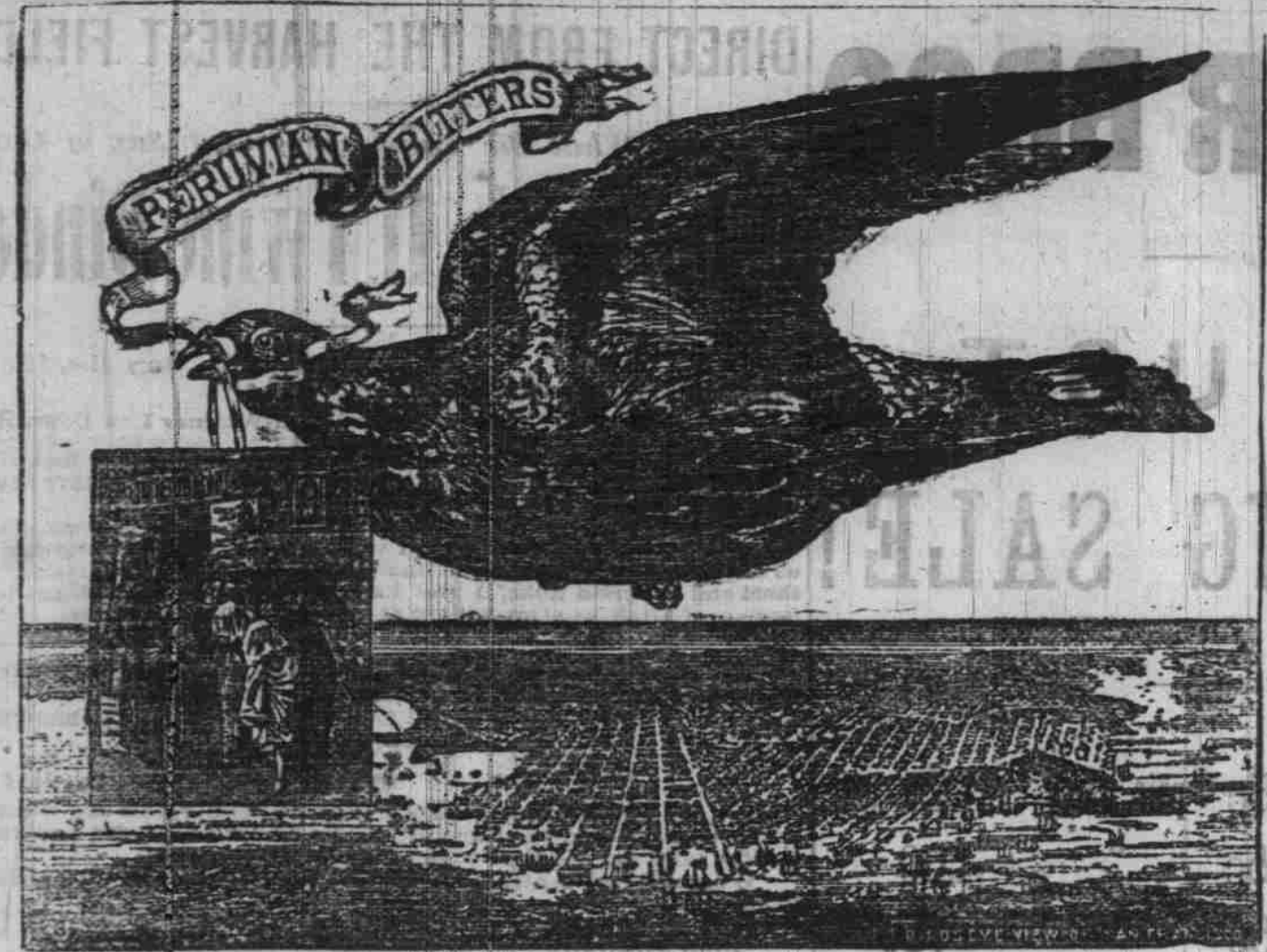
Kansas City, 3.—The belief is current among Irishmen here that O'Donnell, who killed James O'Leary at Park View Monday, is identical with Captain O'Donnell, Phelan, of this city. Phelan left here for Dublin about two months ago, ostensibly to look after a legacy left by some engineer, now dead. Little is known of his subsequent movements, except that he arrived in Dublin during the progress of the Boer war.

Popkai, Kan., 3.—The Daily Capital published a sensational and exaggerated report from Central and Southwestern Kansas, which shows a remarkably heavy crop of grain and vegetables. The yield of wheat is estimated at 60 bushels in Harvey County yielded 105 bushels to the acre, and a field of wheat in the same county 48 bushels to the acre. The prospect is never better for harvest. The corn crop is the largest ever known in Kansas.

New York, 3.—The commission appointed to look into the matter of duties on coverings on imported merchandise, have finished their labor. They decided to report in favor of exempting outside packages from duty. Two reports will be made on the matter of duties on inside coverings, one placing an ad valorem duty on them, and the other in favor of placing a duty on the merchandise only.

A Smuggler's Device. A well known diamond smuggler, whom the New York Custom-house detectives have in vain tried to seize, not long since sailed from New York in the Rhineland. A Hamburg detective came over with him to watch him the whole voyage. This clever smuggler wore a thick, black beard, and it was suspected that he carried his precious freight concealed in them. One morning, not long ago the authorities on this side received a dispatch from their Hamburg friends, which read: "The man has shaved his beard. Did not know it until he had sailed five days. He is on the Rhineland. Has got 70 large diamonds on his person. A second dispatch followed, stating that six custom-house officers steamed down and intercepted her. They looked for the now beardless man, but as they were about to give up the search, a stranger advised: 'You are custom-house officers and you look for Rosenberg, with the diamonds.' 'We are, and we do.' 'That is Rosenberg, and the diamonds are sewed in the lining of his necktie.' In another minute a pale, smooth-faced, sallow man was struggling in their hands. He scarted back from his neck and carefully explored with a sharp penknife. Twenty diamonds of various sizes were found. His trunk was next rummaged, every necktie searched and twelve-thirteen diamonds of great lustre discovered. The fellow wept and wrung his hands.

When the Custom-house officers arrived at headquarters the chief, who held a cablegram in his hand, eagerly inquired: 'Did you get Rosenberg?' 'Yes, sir.' 'Where were the diamonds?' 'Sewed in the lining of his necktie.' 'That's rare! Here's a Hamburg dispatch which says, 'I saw that R. carried the diamonds between his back and a porous plaster.' 'Here are the diamonds, anyhow,' said the leader of the party, 'and we found 'em in the lining of his necktie.' The chief looked at the gems and said: 'Send the jewels apart here.' He came, examined the diamonds, charged his shoulder and said: 'Pass by these jewels. Three francs officers spent the afternoon tracing Mr. Rosenberg. They discovered him at the Metropolitan Hotel and without a word of ceremony burst into his apartment. 'What do you want?' he inquired.
