The dozen or so of doctors who are seeking to graft the delusion of vaccination upon the people of this city and of this State, are working to extend the powers of the medical trust in Utah. It s to be hoped that the people will be ealous of their liberties, and remember that we are not dependent upon a "paternal" government, nor asking for our rights as a favor, but rather that power

and privilege not delegated to our rep them in esentatives and not vested by State's or city's boards of health or others, are still our sacred property, and should be eagerly protected from unlawful assaults. The doctors have received too much

protection" and privileges already rom the people, and now in return for hese, they want to force the public into their straight jacket. Thus, not only is there a lack of proper compensation n the part of the doctors, for the privileges granted them, but actually there is an attempt on their part to force up our children a measure which in many cases has resulted in positive

harm to them. The autocrats of the lancet would fain make the people believe that in their heads alone is deposited the knowledge gained by the experience of centurie

As a matter of fact, the medical profession, like the sectarian world, is split up into factions, the dominant school always trying and often succeeding in preventing from practice those who are not "orthodox;" and in this case,
